Table saw view of our meeting. This saw can be operated with digital controls or manually. A 4X8 sheet of plywood is dwarfed by the size of the sliding table.




Not Your Father's Shaper

More on Hartville Tools:

The Hartville Tool website recognizes an NCWA member by our email address when we log in and automatically gives us a discount. This means that we need to let Hartville Tool know when we change our address. Recently, Verizon "sold out" to Frontier, and everyone who had their email through Verizon had their address changed to Frontier. You-all need to let Hartville Tool know your new address.

This applies to anyone who changes their email address!!! So if you have changed at any time in the past, be sure to check your personal data at Hartville Tool to make sure they have your current email address

All you need to do is the following:

- 1) Go to Hartvilletool.com and click on the "My Account" link which can be found at the very top of any page on their web site.
- 2) Log in using your <u>current</u> email address. If this works, you're home free. If not, log in using your <u>old</u> email address. (If this doesn't work, you are not registered with Hartville as an NCWA member, and you need to let me know.)
- 3) Once logged in using the old email address, click on the red down arrow next to "My Info" on the black bar above the customer information.
- 3) Select "Login/Password" from the drop down.
- 4) Click on the little Pencil icon next to your name and e-mail address, then just follow the instructions to update.

Board of Directors Meeting Cascade Mall, Here We Come!

NCWA's Board of Directors shifted into high gear Wednesday night, June 8th, as time ran out for tinkering with its exhibition aims for Fathers' Day weekend at Mount Vernon's Cascade Mall. The epic event for showcasing our woodworkers' craftsmanship is now!

The Board heard final comments from Jim Bucknell, John Bellinger, Mike Titus and others who have been working hard to prepare our introduction to the shopping public on June 18th and 19th at the center's main entrance. Bucknell assured us that all that could be done has been completed and we are ready to go. Volunteers will assemble at 9 p.m. Friday to move exhibits and presentation equipment into place for the Mall's Saturday morning opening.

Our public exhibition will include greeters at four points who will interpret the various Club displays on more than a dozen tables. The displays of our activities such as library, woodworking classes, and field trips will be augmented by live demonstrations of woodworking techniques and the projects themselves, all with color photos and textual signage.

A feature of this Father' Day event will be halfprice gift membership offerings to NCWA that can be purchased on site. Our greeters will be wearing special aprons bearing our logo and will be handing out the newly reprinted Club brochures.

President Jerry Couchman called the Board together at 7 p.m. at the Farmhouse Restaurant on Route 20. With a quorum present and previous Board meeting minutes approved, the members received Doug Duehning's treasury report of \$3,979. Doug says he has more than two-dozen unclaimed membership cards for 2011. Members can claim them in person from the Treasurer. They will not be mailed.

Education Chairman Gerald Anderson reported that the final class of the Spring would be given

on Saturday (Phil Choquettte's "Wood Finishing, Part II"), winding up a very active 2011 first-half educational season. He reported that 12 different woodworking classes were offered to 85 NCWA members during that period, while 8 instructors participated. He also suggested that we could offer two-hour evening classes and split four-hour classes on Saturdays. A new class already scheduled for the Fall is Val Matthews' course on building a shoulder plane.

Regarding the final preparations for the Cascade Mall exhibit, Jay Geisel reported that the newly redesigned Club brochure was at the printer's and would be ready for distribution on the 18th. Jim Torrence, who is supplying six special aprons wth Club logos attached, said they would also be ready before the 18th. John Bellinger assured members that the woodworking projects for display would be set up in the Mall on Friday night, ready for Saturday morning's opening. Mike Titus, who has the responsibility for member participation and demonstrations, said all was ready to go,

Further Old Business items involved a suggestion by Andrew Pellar that the Club pursue a State-approved non-profit business application in a move that would help guide our organization in a search for insurance waivers that would protect members' coverage during classes and demonstrations.

July's meeting has been changed to Saturday, July 9th from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at Jim Hume's shop. Driving instructions are given in this issue of the Newsletter. Our annual Club picnic is scheduled for August 20 on the Matthews' home grounds.

New Business. The ever-popular Jig Night is expected to be the program for our September meeting at Hillcrest Lodge. President Couchman noted that we are looking for someone to take over the Webmaster duties. Mike New has handled the job since our site was formed years ago. He wants to retire and NCWA needs an experienced replacement.

The offer by Washington Alder for a shop building to be used by NCWA in their Toys for Tots program has the interest of the Washington Woodturners. They would like to share the building with us, according to Jerry. Since we have not responded to the Washington Alder offer, the Board decided it was time for action, An ad-hoc committee was formed to talk with the lumber company's management regarding the fine points and come to a proposal for solution. The committee includes Gene Benson, Andrew Pellar, Ed Pysher, Jim Torrence, and non-Board members Bill Baer and Val Matthews.

The Board adjourned at 8:35 p.m.


Charley Drake; and Chuck Robertson. Signup sheets will be ready for you at the September meeting.

A SIMPLE SHOP MADE TEMPLATE

Miters are not a strong joint; they need to be reinforced. I don't own a biscuit joiner. So I made a simple shop made router template to be used with a template guide. A bearing bit would work also. I cut perfectly aligned hidden slots which hold small loose splines. This template could be used to make finger joins or dovetails as well. Just add a fence. — Andrew Pellar




Drill Press Jig with Replaceable Insert

STOPPED CUTS ON THE TABLE SAW

I attach two simple shop made stops blocks to my fence to make stopped cuts. Recently I made stopped grooves in a frame to hold a panel using this technique. I always turn the saw off to remove the work piece. I use the closest stop as a pivot point to ease the work on top of the spinning blade to start the cut.


