Board Minutes

Arts Alive! Crisis Captures Board's Attention

In the past 60 days the NCWA Board of Directors has been working on problems much more serious than the usual kind at their monthly meetings. Loss of venue could spell disaster for our participation in future *Arts Alive!* events.

Most of you know that the LaConner Chamber of Commerce has denied our use of the Civic Garden Club building this November. It is their determination that the building should be used for local and professional artists to exhibit their work during that weekend as additional display space is needed to augment space in Maple Hall. That edict could put NCWA and NWWA out of business unless we find a suitable venue in the next few weeks.

President Jim Torrence and Venues Chairman Phil Choquette have been leading the search for an alternate venue. The down economy has forced the closing of several stores on First street and that has led to consideration of renting a vacant store for the three-day festival. We have an understanding and pending offer for one of three possible vacant store sites that have the size to handle our combined clubs' exhibitions, provided that they are not leased prior to *Arts Alive!* In the meantime, your club is registering with the Chamber to participate in the event again this year just as if we had a venue.

Our mission since NCWA was founded is to "promote high standards in woodworking, craftsmanship, education, and to showcase the work of our local woodworkers." Our primary "showcase" for more than 20 years has been *Arts Alive*! With WoodFest continuation uncertain, *Arts Alive*! is a significant event for our club. Board members are hopeful that a rental solution will succeed, but we have

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probably seen the last of the Civic Garden Club.

HOLDING WORK

In other business, the Board defeated a motion that would print a detailed Treasurer's report in the monthly Newsletter. The practice of reporting the treasury balance at the monthly general meeting will continue.

Jim Bucknell, Progam chairman, reported problems with the planned September program by a Festool rep. He proposed that the presentation be scrubbed. The Board approved.

Educational classes for the next term will likely begin in late September, according to Chuck Robertson, Education chairman. Although his full calendar of classes has been approved, venues for the first few have not been settled. Chuck said that his committee now numbers six individuals.

Jerry Couchman reported that an opportunity to rent booth space at a forthcoming woodworking exhibition in Port Townsend had been received. The offer was discussed but the booth was small and the price high. In addition, Board members felt the difficulties in ferry scheduling added problems to seller and buyer alike. The Board moved to decline the offer.

Treasurer Doug Duehning reported a Treasury balance of \$4,433.

At 8 p.m. the Board voted to adjourn.

Sometimes figuring out how to hold a work piece can be a challenge.



My tenon cutting jig uses a cam with an offcenter pivot point to secure work vertically. It is much faster than a clamp, the four cuts -2 on each end - require just the flick of a wrist to reposition and secure the work. And it is strong. I cut tenons on the end of a work piece 3" thick, 5" wide. and 48" long.

Small work can present big challenges. My shop made hold down adjusts for different thicknesses and widths. Because it is made of wood, I never have to worry about the saw blade contacting the clamp head. Easy to make and cheap, I use these on my cross cut sled and tapering jig.
