Toys, Toys and More Toys!!!

It was the best of times. We ended the year 2008 with a fantastic spirit of giving to the needy children in Skagit and Whatcom Counties. Members and spouses and like-minded guests assembled in Mount Vernon's Hillcrest Lodge to eat pizza together and show their enthusiasm and generosity for the **Toys for Tots** Christmas donation on Tuesday, December 2nd.

The meeting attracted a large attendance of more than 60 persons of caring hearts who were clearly embracing an emotional feeling of community spirit and an eagerness to contribute to this popular cause. A passionate appeal for cash donations by our **Toys for Tots** Chairman **Glenn Koontz** resulted in a collection of **\$1,123!** This amount was an outstanding contribution that more than doubled last year's response.

Invited guests included three of the top organizational leaders of the local **US Marine Corps Reserve** who voluntarily take on the task of the year-round **Toys for Tots** program in our area. We were also honored with the presence of **L. Stedem Wood**, publisher of the **Skagit Valley** Herald newspaper and Richard Tinney, President and owner of the Washington Alder plant in Skagit County. Washington Alder has, for the past several years, been the principal donor of lumber used in creating our handmade toys. Their generosity has made it possible for NCWA members to work around the year creating an increasing annual toy production that culminates in delivery to the Corps at Christmastime.

The front of the Lodge meeting room was filled with hundreds of toys made for children, ages 2 to 15 years, and the profusion of creative ideas was remarkable. Our toymakers donated wood gifts large and small, from rocking horses and doll cradles to grasshoppers and bumblebee pulls.

Wood vehicles and airplanes filled the tables to capacity and the women's groups again sewed comfy layettes for the cradles. All in all, more than 250 individually made, finely crafted toys were turned over to the Marines. There were many speeches by our guests who described the allvolunteer program that collects and stores 6,500 toys a year for delivery to organizations that see to the needs of thousands of children. In Skagit County, 1,700 families received help last year. We learned that 97 percent of money donations go directly to buying toys and that last year the Marine Corps distribution hit a high of 7,350 toys. Briefings were given by **Richard Crosssley**, the coordinator of the local detachment and his cocoordinator, **Jeff Murphy**, and also by **William McCutchin**, State Commandant for the Marine Corps League. They told us that our toys are distributed in the area from the Canadian border to as far south as Stanwood.

Woodworkers had business to take care of also. Vice President **Jeff O'Donnell** called for an introduction of the guests and also identified some new members. He then asked officers and committee chairmen for reports and followed this with two other items on the evening's agenda.

As is customary in December, we held an election of officers for 2009. The nominating committee recommended that **Jeff O'Donnell**, Vice President for 2008, advance to the Presidency and selected **Jim Torrence** as our new Vice President. Current Treasurer **Doug Duehning** and Secretary **Jay Geisel** were nominated for another year of service. Their being no other nominations, a vote was taken and the slate was approved unanimously. The other business item was approval of the rewritten and expanded NCWA By-laws. The Club's original By-laws were written three-dozen years ago and found wanting for an organization that has blossomed to almost 100 members. An ad hoc committee of **Jim Torrence**, **Jay Geisel**, and **Dave Blair** submitted their revision to the Board last fall and copies were made available to all members in November. Acceptance was required by a majority of the assembled membership and this was accomplished at the December meeting. The new NCWA By-laws can be read and downloaded from our website (http://www.ncwawood.org).

Eugene Benson, who originated the **NCWA Toys for Tots** program and served as its chairman for four years, will again take the reins next year from **Glenn Koontz** who has served his promised two-year term. Glenn has motivated many woodworkers into toy-making projects and has been a factor in strengthening the Club's program. Gene is a prolific producer of quality toys and has a deep-rooted devotion for **Toys for Tots**.

Our club members generously responded to the **Toys for Tots** program run by the Marines. At our annual banquet on December 2, 2008 we made and donated over 260 toys to the Marines for the **Toys for Tots** project, including those later brought in by **Rick Anderson** and others. The club members and their guests are to be especially thanked for their generous outpouring of dollars to assist the Marines program. A total of **\$1123** was raised including monies which arrived by mail at a later date.

Our special guests for the evening **Mr. Richard Tinney** owner of **Washington Alder**, who generously donated wood to make toys spoke to the club. His daughter and granddaughter and office manager **Cathy Shalamunec** were also present. **Mr. L. Stedem Wood**, publisher of the **Skagit Valley Herald** addressed the club and

gave us a history of the Herald's Christmas Fund and how they work to meet current needs. Five Marines and guests were also present and there to receive the toys and donations.

Cec Braeden Returns to Fine Woodworking Magazine

Cec Braeden is back in print on the pages of *Fine Woodworking*. Our talented rocking chair man and workbench innovator has been given a page in the February 2009 issue, just received, to exploit another great woodworking technique. In answer to a reader's question on how best to edge-band a plywood panel, the editors turned to Cec for an answer, and it was the one he demonstrated to us about four years ago in his own shop.

Cec's technique is to make veneer strips from the same plywood work piece, thus matching grain and color. With printed photos and instructions on page 82, he shows how to cut one-inch wide veneer strips on the table saw and then cutting them free by placing the plywood face down on the table. The veneer is then glued to the panel edges. Finally, he suggests that you pare away the veneer that overhangs the work piece with a chisel. "You can cut veneers that run with the grain and across the grain, so you can match any side of the plywood," he writes.

The diagram by the *Fine Woodworking* illustrator

is incorrect, however. It shows the saw blade destroying the veneer rather than properly cutting into the core behind it. Cec values his glue line saw blade for this type of work. It's a great idea from our own esteemed woodworker. -Jay Geisel

Meet the Membership Committee

At the last board meeting we decided to "showcase" one committee each month, to emphasize the amount of work these folks do for NCWA and to remind members of the services the committees provide. Since I raised the question, I get to go first, which only goes to prove that no good deed goes unpunished.

The Membership committee provides a variety of services. Last year, we started making "house calls" to new members to learn about their woodworking interests, skill levels, and expectations from membership. We specifically wanted to find out how we could help them increase their enjoyment with woodworking, and to integrate them into NCWA. The information we have gathered in these interviews has often provided input to the other committees, such as Education and Monthly Programs.

The trial visits were very helpful and we now have an expanded "questionnaire" that we will use to make sure we don't miss something. We would like to expand this activity to include "interviews" with current members, to see if there are some things we could do better, or perhaps just differently, and maybe more fun.

Another service we provide has to do with "community awareness". We now have a new supply of brochure stands and will be positioning them with the woodworking vendors in our area. The stands hold copies of the brochure we revised this year, and we have a brochure supply that should last us for a while.

A favorite of everyone has been the shop tours. We now have that effort staffed and we hope to begin the tours in February. We haven't decided on the format for this year, but that should be settled in time to begin the tours soon. This service is one of my personal favorites. I always learn a lot when I visit someone else's shop.

Probably the most important service the Committee provides is decent coffee and darn good cookies at the monthly meetings. I assume everyone has noticed the vast improvement in the quality of the coffee since I stopped making it.

The Committee members are geographically located. Jerry Couchman represents the Committee north of Bellingham, and Jim Bucknell handles the Bellingham area. Larry Tomovick takes care of Anacortes, and I work in the Sedro Woolley and Mount Vernon areas. We need someone in the "south end" and will be conscripting soon, if we don't get a volunteer. Gary Danileson and John Bellinger are working on shop tours and last, but far from the least, let's have a standing ovation for Marshal Eberhart, our own private coffee meister.

Education Committee Report

In December we had two very successful classes. The first one was on routers, bits, and jigs taught by Phil Choquette at Mike New's shop in Bow. We had a record 13 members in attendance. Phil showed us a variety of different routers from a small Dremel to a large Milwaukie and several in between. If you are thinking about a new router, he said to get one that draws 10 amps or more. Don't pay much attention to the horsepower as the way this is measured is not appropriate for the end user. I thought his information on bits boiled down to "you get what you paid for," but not always. The second class was on making drawers at Chuck Robertson's on Camano Island. In this one, five members made two drawers with a
