January Program: Hand Plane Techniques and Sharpening By Tony Konovaloff

As NCWA has grown we see bigger participation in Bring 'n Brag response. This is heartening. Our members are putting their tools to good use and are showing pride in their work. December's display was no exception as a dozen individuals filled tables with some mighty fine woodworking.

Professionals Tom Dolese and David Helm led the way with stunning examples of their recent endeavors. Dolese's (below) pedestal table in sapele was finished in an oil/varnish mix that Tom calls "conversion varnish." Helm (right) displayed boxes, one with fabric inlay and another with a live edge top. Both, of big leaf maple, were finished with Maloof oil and wax.









Jerry Couchman's pagoda box was a half-scale model of this type shown previously. His materials included walnut, Alaska yellow cedar, ebony, and brass, all finished in a blended varnish.(right)

Al Ashley completed a foot stool as a project in Bill Baer's introductory woodworking course last month. Pine was his wood choice (left).

NORTHWEST CORNER WOODWORKER'S ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE DESCRIPTIONS

Here's a description of the committees. The list is based on our activities of the past several years and is designed to both spread the load and to get everyone involved. The "minimum" members for each committee include the chairperson. More folks than the "minimum" can certainly be on a committee. The more the merrier.

EDUCATION, minimum 4 members:

Education is the hallmark of NCWA. That, plus companionship, is the reason we are who we are. This Committee will be responsible for the continued design, implementation and monitoring of specific education programs. The program will of necessity be coordinated with the monthly program.

TOURS & EXCHANGE MEETINGS, minimum 3 members:

Each year we have several tours, usually one to Vancouver to Lee Valley or other woodworking show in the Vancouver area, one to Seattle to the annual woodworker's show and a resources trip to Seattle. This committee will be responsible for the organization of these events.

Library News

Review: "Chisel, Mallet, Plane and Saw" by Tony Konovaloff

Tony Konovaloff has done woodworking exclusively with hand tools for over 25 years. He has recently written (and self-published) the book "Chisel, Mallet, Plane and Saw" which explores both the why and the how of hand tool woodworking. The book is not long, 146 pages, and contains chapters on Tony's philosophy and experience, how to use specific tools (saws, handplanes, etc.), how to sharpen (Tony favors oilstones), and how to use hand tools to construct carcases, doors, and drawers.

Tony favors oil-and-beeswax finishes and he includes a chapter on how to make and apply this kind of finish.

There is also a chapter on Tony's famous tool chest (featured in Jim Tolpin's "Toolbox Book") discussing the design and construction of the chest, and listing every tool the chest contains (which makes a great shopping list if you're just starting to get into hand tool woodworking).

The book also includes short chapters on some of Tony's favorite woodworking books, business tips, and a glossary.

Tony's book is an opinionated but enjoyable and informative read and has earned a place in my shop.

Chuck Robertson, an NCWA member & class instructor, recently had his shop tip about his versatile plastic router base published, with photos. It can be seen in the December issue of Shop Notes, Vol. 22, Issue 127. He received a cash award for this. All of our members can contribute some very unique shop tips, and should be encouraged to do so.
