February Meeting Notes

NCWA Burlington Library. Shout Out Grabs Attention

With an 80-plus crowd in attendance on a week-delayed, offbeat Monday night in February, members enjoyed yet another show-off in a series of member project challenges. This time the theme was "Something for the Kitchen" and the response was heartening.

Shut out of our usual Tuesday meeting place at Hillcrest Park Lodge in Mount Vernon, we settled in again at the Burlington Library on their first available date, which fell on Monday, February 11th. Despite the twists we had high attendance. Gary Weyers who heads up Member Activities, managed to get a strong delegation together to exhibit a variety of ideas for the home kitchen. Cutting boards, as you might expect, were the choice of most participating woodworkers. No less than seven boards --thin and thick, small to very large, and almost all made of contrasting wood species--were on display.

President Andrew Pellar asked for committee reports from Education chairman Gerald Anderson, Program chairman Jerry Couchman, Tours chairman Jay Geisel and Shop Tours chairman Gary Danilson. Treasurer Doug Duehning reported that he was still receiving late dues payments and would continue to do so. Gary Danilson told the assembly that the popular April visit to member workshops would be centered in the Bellingham area. (Details can be found elsewhere in this issue of the Newsletter).

Pellar explained to members that a plan to make our December meeting a holiday celebration has been proposed, and he wanted the membership to voice their preferences at this meeting. In essence, the November meeting would deal with the year-ending submittal of Toys for Tots and the usual ceremony that accompanies it. The December meeting would celebrate Christmas with members' family gathered together for a holiday meal. No meals would be served at the November meeting. The Club voted overwhelmingly for the December Holiday Party at the meeting. The proposal was called to vote and passed, thereby ratifying the Club's wishes.

An NCWA proposal to visit Lee Valley Tools in Vancouver in April was presented by Jay Geisel, Tours chairman. A popular bus tour in the past, the proposal died unsupported when a minimum goal of 25 persons fell short.

The evening's program, a first time trial at problem-solving woodworkers' conundrums, set up a panel of five major craftsmen at the front of the room and had them attempt to decide how to fix problems submitted by two individual members. Couchman and Pellar introduced Joe Hoffman to panelists Art Learmonth, Rick Anderson, Andy Rudy, Val Matthews, and Tom Dolese. Joe had made his first veneered box on the table saw but had trouble setting up the hinges. The panelists, with help from the floor via Bill Baer and Phil Choquette, set him straight. Some of their suggestions were to place the jig closer to the fence and "Next time use a router."

The second challenge was somewhat tougher when Ben Gage addressed them with one of his geodesic/round ball type bafflers. The problem was tear-out when using his off-center turning jig. Panelists had a good laugh but couldn't help him. (Gage keeps pushing the envelope with his skills and talents.



Hand Tool Special Interest Group

I bought a couple of hand saws for cheap, figuring they would be good candidates to explore saw sharpening. I read a little bit about the subject and planned to just give it a try. However, in talking with some other club members, I learned that others had knowledge about the subject and would be willing to share their knowledge. This is what Special Interest Groups are all about – getting together with fellow members to explore special interests.

Fellow club members Mike Titus and David Shull joined me for this group session. We learned about the geometry of saws. Terms such as TPI and Pitch and Fleam, Slope and Rake came to have more than academic meaning as we dove into the task. Like any new skill the road was not without bumps. While the basic concepts were not difficult, putting them to practice in a consistent manner was more challenging. This was my first time trying to sharpen a saw; it was in rough shape and badly need care. But I learned the basics and managed to get a saw sharper with some guidance.

David Selditz at The Center For Furniture Craftsmanship

The following is from NCWA member **David Selditz**, past presenter and member of Artwood. He's currently enrolled in a 9 month comprehensive woodworking program at the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship in Rockport, Maine. The program started last September and runs through May. I don't quite know where to start because I've been busy since the first day of class. It really is an information overload experience. We finished the seven week case work segment and today we began bending and veneering with some marquetry and inlaying seminars in between. At the end of February we have the multiples segment where we design, build and price a piece of furniture that's easily and quickly knocked out and sells. After it's jigged the rest is bread and butter. Lastly, from April until the end is the chair making segment which I'm looking forward to. It'll be taught by Tom Keely who set up John

Makepeace's shop in London. He's a crazy Englishman and I welcome crazy people from the UK.

I'll tell you a little about the school and try not to bore you. I never expected the level of instruction offered here because most of the instructors are from the UK and Australia. Their methods of teaching woodworking are different than the manner it's taught by a lot of instructors here. It's a pedagogy and a bit didactic in the beginning but for me it gave me a sense of structure and continuity which is what I think I needed. At this point things changed when the disciplines were practically applied to designing and making furniture. The course is segmented in different disciplines - case work, bending and veneering, multiples, and chair making. I forgot to mention the first project was a simple bench and a wall hung tool case made entirely on machines.

My lead instructor is Aled Lewis from the UK and he is one of the loveliest guys. He has the patience of a saint and knows everything about this discipline. He attended Rycotewood in London for two years in the '70's and ran his own shop making bespoke furniture and now has a job teaching here for the next few years. Neil Erasmus came in from Australia to help teach the case work segment and was just as terrific. Today we started with Adrian Ferrazuti who you probably know - (College of the Redwoods) who knows more about wood bending than anyone I've talked to.



I don't feel I'll be an expert or master woodworker when I return but I'll be much more confident with a broader working knowledge and hopefully some credibility after this is over. I've



always wanted to teach but didn't feel I had the chops to do so, but when I come home I want to make it an integral part of what I do and maybe give back to the guild in some way.

Spring Shop Tour

We'll be visiting the shops of some of our fellow clubmembers in the Bellingham area on Sat, March 16. The first shops will be open at 8:30 and we'll be having a bite to eat at our last shop around noon. We'll see some examples of making great use of both small and large shop areas including some innovative ideas on dust collection systems. There will be some good ideas for tool and wood storage and good examples of outfeed tables on a variety of machines. There will be a marquetry demonstration and we'll see numerous examples of the kind of quality craftsmanship your fellow NCWA members are producing in their shops. Whether you are new to woodworking or an old hand you'll see ideas that might work in your shop.

Plan on coming and bring a friend if you think they are interested in learning more about NCWA. Tour information will be available at our March meeting and will also be e-mailed to the membership.

Shop Tips!

Hand Rubbed Look. If you want to give a semi-gloss finish that "hand-rubbed" look all you need is a brown paper bag (the kind you find in the grocery store).. The paper is slightly abrasive so it buffs the finish without acutally cutting through it.
Burn Marks. It's easy to leave nasty burn marks when routing a profile onto the edge of a piece of cherry. And sanding a routed profile is tough. It's easier to remove burn marks if you apply mineral spirits to the mark before sanding. The solvent penetrates the glazed area, and after a few minutes, you can sand if off easily.

NCWA Board Meeting February 13, 2013

NCWA Board of Directors met at the Farm House Restaurant on Route 20 near Mount Vernon at 7 p.m., President Andrew Pellar presiding.

A budget for 2013, WoodFest in April, and an increase in Club one-time lecture fees were topics that dominated the meeting. Treasurer Doug Duehning is working on the new budget for the year and directors' are concentrating on future needs as they consider all line-item expenses. Changes from previous years result from a rapid increase in enrollment. Costs of personal service items like name tags, printing, coffee and cookies, library, audio-visual efficiency, and education have risen along with the growth.

Program chairman Jerry Couchman asked for more leeway in spending fees for higher-priced speakers. He would like to engage a highly regarded instructor from the Whidbey Island School of Woodworking to a future NCWA meeting and such a singular event would price above our current policy. Following discussions, the Board voted to re-set the budget limit for speakers to \$500. Jerry would like to bring us a presentation by Garrett Hack or Chris Schwartz.

Several changes to the proposed new budget were agreed upon and Duehning is expected to have a final version ready for the Board's approval next month. Doug reported that 43 members did not re-sign for 2013. Of these, 17 were new members in 2011 and 2012, and included five who signed on at Cascade Mall last year. Our total membership stands at 125.

WoodFest, the Skagit County High School student woodworking competition at Sedro Woolley High School is set for the weekend of April 6 and 7. Chairmen Phil Choquette and Jim Torrence have been in contact with the event sponsor, the Sedro Woolley Chamber of Commerce, and have promised our support again this year. Held during the month-long Tulip Festival, WoodFest invitees include all county high schools that have student woodworking programs.

As in years past, Phil requested the Board to exhibit our members' projects on two tables and asked for suggestions regarding the active demonstrations we might provide this year. The Board agreed to again provide the People's Choice award, a high-value wood plane, that will be engraved with the winner's name. Jerry Couchman again volunteered to make a box that will be donated to the WoodFest public raffle. Phil announced that members will set up their displays between 7 and 9 a.m. on Saturday and remove them after 2 pm. on Sunday. Woodfest will be open to the public from 9 a.m.to 4 p.m. on Saturday and from 10 a.m. to 2p.m. on Sunday.

Librarian chair Gary Danilson explained one of the problems facing his Library committee is keeping control of a growing amount of books and videos, and tracking their movement through a growing readership. He noted a scanning bar code system might be in the works. A larger budget will soon be needed to replace missing items and to add new ones. The Library is also receiving numerous gifts from members..

Gary, who is in charge of visitations to members shops twice a year, is completing plans for the April tour in the Bellingham area. The schedule and directions will be announced soon. The tour will end again at Tom Dolese's shop where a buffet will conclude the day's events.

Webmeister Mike Titus said that our Website continues to grow as he finds time to expand the many features he wants to offer.

Jessica Haag announced a call for volunteers at our general meeting on Monday night. Jessica is a member of the Leadership Skagit group, the same group that asked for our help in repairing summer cabins for the Camp Fire Girls several years ago. Working with the Skagit Valley Hospital's Cancer Center, Jessica's group would like to find some person to construct a wig tree for the Cancer Resource room where patients can try on wigs in privacy. **Gerald Anderson and Bill Baer** agreed to build the project. The project envisions a hat and wig tree and some shelving to display informational pamphlets.

Educational classes chairman, Gerald Anderson, told the Board that he would be alert to keep nonmembers from attending woodworking classes. Jerry said that a person tried to sign up for a class who had never been a member. That person got his information from our Website. Jerry informed us classes will soon be full as well as what subjects are still to be offered and where the vacancies exist.
