THE MANY FACES OF DICK WEBER



Dick Weber

Dick Weber wowed us with his deft movements as he masterfully taught his carving techniques honed over 30 years of carving. He fell in love with wood carving in Alaska in 1970 after seeing the world's tallest totem pole. He took classes and did Native American carving for 15 years. Dick taught wood carving for many years at North Seattle Community College. His first caricature carving was a Santa after which he was on to many other characters. Dick added carving birds to his résumé about 3 years ago.

We were treated to a step-by-step demonstration of carving eyes, laugh lines, beards, etc. Flat board or block of wood –nothing was beyond Dick's abilities. We watched as the corner of a block of basswood morphed into a face, punch cut by V cut by gouge. Although Dick needs only 5 or 6 tools to effectively carve faces, the knives are well chosen and must be skillfully handled. Although nothing seemed quite as effective as his aggressively deployed 'knife in the eye' technique!

Dick buys his knives locally from Gil Drake in Arlington. His kit includes 9 tools. He doesn't use stones to sharpen them; he uses a rag wheel and a strop of leather on plywood.

The speed and skill was admired by all, but, as Dick deadpanned, "I learned all this on one day. I practiced 10 years and then one day I learned it."



LIBRARY NEWS

WOOD BENDING MADE SIMPLE by Lon Schleining

The very informative eight chapters in this book and accompanying DVD cover nearly all aspects of wood bending that we will use in making our projects. The problems we are likely to encounter are explained and illustrated with detailed color photographs. Techniques to simplify our work and eliminate many of the pitfalls are described clearly. A brief description of the contents:

- Chapter 1: Bending forms (how to build them)
- Chapter 2: Cutting laminates (the easy way to get wood to bend)
- Chapter 3: Dry clamping and choosing glue (how to assemble your bent wood and eliminate problems)
- Chapter 4: Gluing up and clamping (Spreading the right sticky stuff the right way & in the right place)
- Chapter 5: Milling the bent lamination (Removing the sticky stuff & finishing the bent part)
- Chapter 6: Setting up for steam bending (making a steam box and steam bending forms)
- Chapter 7: Steam bending (What you need to do to successfully steam-bend wood)

Chapter 8: Bending with a heating blanket (How dry heat works still another method of wood bending) Metric conversion chart

Resources Glossary

In the DVD, the book's author demonstrates all the chapters in the book, using excellent video and teaching techniques. The combination of a book and video makes this an outstanding addition to our library. Jerry Anderson

NOVEMBER BRING AND BRAG

Tom Dolese showed off an adjustable backed lounge chair crafted from sapele with matching ottoman, and finished in oil, varnish and wax. Tom will be teaching a class on building that same chair.

Bob Gaubatz presented louvered cabinet doors of red oak and finished in shellac and polyurethane.

Jaime Lajarin built a shaker style end table of cherry and highly figured maple veneer that he made himself. He incorporated table saw beveled legs and finished the table in oil, with the top being done in polyurethane.

Tim Houston, inspired by his son-in-law's cooking, made a plaque for his club, named "Club Purple". Inlay was done in maple and Tim used purple heart for the wine in the goblet. He finished the plaque in lacquer.

Frank Carlson offered a 7' tall cabinet with many drawers, ideal for storing small parts on a shop or for a kitchen. The drawer fronts are finished with formica and sport handles of woods from the world over provided by a 93 year old friend.

Greg Koenker displayed a mirror and floor stand of sapele and ebony. He designed it from a 3' by 1 ¹/₂ " sketch in a book. He reminds that WD-40 on hinges for this sort of project might not be the best idea he's ever had!

Charley Drake gave us a preview of Dick Weber's presentation by showing off hand carved figurines he'd done in one of Dick's classes. He finished them in acrylic paints.

In the "Bring but Don't Brag" category, Nancy Anderson displayed evidence of having broken both bones in her left forearm. She had done the same procedure on her Baldor sander many times. But this time she chose to ignore that 'quiet, little voice' that warned her that something was unsafe about what she was about to do.

Board Meeting November 13, 2013

The NCWA Board of Directors held its November meeting at the Farm House restaurant on Route 20 in Mount Vernon on Wednesday evening, November 13, 2013, at 7 p.m. with President Andrew Pellar presiding. Pellar prepared the attendees with an Agenda issued for the meeting. Board meeting Minutes for the October meeting were read and approved.

The Board turned its attention to the forthcoming Christmas party scheduled for Tuesday evening, December 3rd. Party chairman Gary Danilson discussed the event plans in detail while getting opinions from Board members. Alcoholic drinks were ruled out, but a full evening of fun and prizes were ruled in. Activities will include a Spirit award, a 2x4 Challenge, and a raffle of woodcarver Dick Weber's small carvings that were donated to the Club. Other actions will honor Toys for Tots seasonal gifting. Prizes furnished by some of our discount vendors will also be on tap.

Jerry Couchman, Programs chair, discussed plans for early 2014 meetings and gave members a chance to choose or suggest their desires. January will feature an old favorite: Jig Night: a chance to show your favorite tool, jig, or shop fixture. February will feature a wood finishing demonstration by member Phil Choquette. A demonstration on how to make Green and Green arts and crafts details will be given by David Selditz in March, Couchman said.

Board Meeting Continued

Classes for 2014 and registration requirements were discussed by Education chair Jerry Anderson. Jerry must assure member status before registrations take place for the new classes, which will be taken on-line and at general meetings. Pay your dues or don't signup, Jerry said. He reviewed class attendance figures for the past two months and gave a preview of classes to be given early next year. Jerry will decide if mid-week evening classes or double Saturday classes are to be offered when popular ones are in high demand.

Members approved purchase of a white board for use in our A-V presentations as requested by videographer Charley Drake.

The Club's participation in April's WoodFest event was introduced. Phil Choquette, Chair for this event, said it was too early to take action as the Sedro Woolley town Council has yet to determine when and if they will host Wood-Fest again in 2014. Phil said he will keep in contact with the proper people.

Pellar is asking members to address the broader issue of where NCWA is heading and what we should be planning and thinking about as we head into the new year. Among the issues ahead are the Mall Show. What should we do differently? Among the ideas floated were reviewing recent past Bring 'n Brag items and putting the best on display. Or, possibly doing a final assembly of a project (an Adirondak chair, for example) and finishing it at the show. Pellar suggested charity work also: build a kitchen, bookcase, or partner with Habitat or others.

Pellar told the Board that a substantial discount for woodworking magazine subscribers is in the works. Members will get the opportunity to subscribe or extend their subscriptions soon. These discounts are generally 30 percent lower than regular prices.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40 p.m.
