MIXING AND USING SHELLAC BY PHIL CHOQUETTE

This month's presentation will be given by our resident finishing expert, Phil Choquette, who happens to be one of our club's founding members. Phil joined the guild in 1984 about when it was formed by a small group of local woodworkers. Phil retired from the US Navy in 1978 where he served as an air traffic controller for most of his 26 years in the service. His woodworking career goes much farther back and included a cabinet shop in Florida. Restoring and refinishing furniture eventually became his area of expertise and still is today; although, he occasionally takes on other woodworking commissions. Phil plans to discuss some of the history and misconceptions of shellac and share many of his trade secrets for great finishing. We'll even be treated to a short demonstration and get the chance to watch shellac dry!

Gene Benson's passion for Toys for Tots was evident as well as his gratitude for all who have taken the time to make toys. He passed on a letter of praise from Lynn Postler for NCWA's contribution of various wooden toys in support of the Skagit Valley Herald's Christmas Fund. Gene also emphasized the quality and latent value of toys you build compared to those purchased commercially. He reminded that plans and wood are available to any to get involved by talking to himself, Val Matthews or Bill Baer.

President Andrew Pellar's commitment to the club was recognized as Jerry Anderson presented him with a gift certificate. Andrew is staying in office past his term expiration until a new president is selected.

Librarian Gary Danilson introduced some of the new books: How to make picture Frames, Best Workshops, Greene and Greene's How-Tos, and several on wood carving and wood turning. Someone has taken the time to create DVDs of some of our VHS tapes and they are available to check out.

locking spheres. He had to design special knives/gouges to do this amazing project. He took his tool drawings to a KK Industries where tool steel was rough out on a laser CNC machine. He then finished the 7 specialty tools and put a nice edge on each. A stand lifts the top sphere up slightly to give the effect of it floating free of the lower one.

Andy Rudy showed a shop-built mortise fixture he has successfully used for years. He also takes twisted pleasure in working with wood with knots in it; he made a chess board of pine knots. The dark squares are of knots crosscut, while the light ones are ripped with the grain. The pitch build up from the knotty pine was so severe at one point that it stalled his band saw, and the fragrant chess board served as an air freshener for some time after the project was completed.



JANUARY MEETING (CONTINUED)

Steve Wagoner used an old WWII era straight line metal shaper in making two quality squares of brass and walnut. One is a dovetail square and the other a saddle square. Move over Starrett!

Bill Dowe, luthier, showed us a jig he uses to get the proper arc to braces for guitar tops and backs. The one he displayed was made of ash and is unfinished. He set the degree of bend by literally marking it off from a 25 ft radius circle.

Andrew Pellar brought three block planes, one of which he picked up at a garage sale and used as an object lesson for his recent class on tuning block planes. "The Patient", a Stanley 220, looks considerably healthier than when he first found it, but it will never be the tool that either his WoodRiver or Lie Nielsen block planes are. The end-grain on the pine board trimmed by it wasn't bad though. Andrew also suggested the value of rare earth magnets in a small pill vial for cleaning the fine metal particles off sandpaper when sharpening irons and chisels. Among other possible uses, the vial makes a great handle when mounted on the side of a plane to grip while lapping the other side.

Bob Gaubatz needed a mallet so he took some scrap oak and made himself one, his first effort at a through-tenon. It looked good in tung oil. He also built an excellent center-finding gage out of wood and finished it in tung oil as well. His favorite new tool is the GRR-Ripper by Woodcraft

Jim Bucknell showed us a jig from Veritas to set stop points for planing and three boxes that he built. The boxes were designed by Jim's wife, Judy. (Judy makes cardboard mock-ups that are remarkable in themselves!) The art deco box was of cherry and sapele with brass inserts and finished in semi gloss polyurethane. The other two involved compound angles: a box on a pedestal of lacewood with a sapele top and the other one of figured Brazilian cherry, figured maple and walnut. Both were finished in satin polyurethane.

Jerry Haynes found a plan for a civil war era officer's table and made one out of knotty maple. An oak slat is set to spring into a slot to hold the legs in place once it is unfolded. Quite ingenious!

David Shull made a chest of sapele with holly line and birch berry inlay. To do this project he made a few different tools: a radius cutter (patterned after one that sells for \$300!) and a ribbon slicing tool to cut out the inlay material.

JANAUARY MEETING (CONTINUED)





Mike Titus showed off an antique fillister plane that he bought while at a class at Roy Underhill's school in North Carolina. The plane perhaps was built in Connecticut during or shortly after the Civil War and was made of beech and boxwood.

Cecil Braeden brought a jewelry box he made out of maple using his band saw. The barrel hinges were demanding but are a nice touch. Cec finished the box sealing it with Benite and then several coats of Minwax wipe on poly and then paste wax.

Gene Benson brought two wooden toys designed to demonstrate mechanical concepts, one of which was an oil pump/derrick and the other portrayed a reciprocating engine. His patterns came from a book, Making Wooden Mechanical Models. He is making on prototypes of several models and hopes to see classes at Boys and Girls Clubs centered around these to encourage greater understanding of science and engineering concepts.

Jerry Couchman needed a jig to make a leg to build a pagoda box (well, several of them). So he took the time to make one to use on his router table, as well as jigs for other curves he needed cut as well. While snooping shops in Port Townsend, Jerry spotted a solid rosewood jack plane sporting a date of 1837 on it. It was unusual for the very thick steel from which the tapered iron was made. He calls it a scrub plane and expects to make good use of it.

Don Wilkins made himself a dovetail vise of scrap wood that sports hardwood screws he made. He also found a solution to preventing unintentionally chiseling your leg –a simple solution that didn't require hours but provides great results.

- D. Transition to the new server is in progress and will take about a week. Intermittent interruptions might be experienced.
- 3. Treasurer's Report.
 - A. Reported on efforts to get delinquent members to pay dues. Currently NCWA has 136 paid members for the year and 29 delinquent members. Roster will be updated after Feb meeting.
 - B. Rental Contract for the lodge for CY2015 was approved.
 - C. Draft budget for the year 2014 was distributed and discussed.

i. Andrew Pellar indicated that he had received a request to increase library budget by \$50. This was approved by consensus.

ii. General discussion about increasing funding for presenters at monthly meeting. No final decision reached.

iii. General discussion about 'grossing out' Education Program (to date the program had only shown a 'net' of the income and expenses). General consensus that this was a good idea and that it also should be done for the Toys for Tots program.

iv. Jay Geisel recommended bumping the annual awards budget by \$50.
