GREEN & GREEN ARTS AND CRAFTS DETAILS

David Selditz was one of our guest speakers three years ago, then joined our club. His shop has been on one of our shop tours and he recently signed up as an instructor teaching Accuracy in Marking and Measuring. He has been a woodworker since his Army days and has lived in the Bellingham area for about 8 years. Last year, he attended the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship in Rockport, Maine on an intensive 9 month course that included just about every aspect of woodworking. They studied joinery, wood bending using steam and lamination, veneering, inlay, marquetry and much more. His presentation will focus on the detail work that goes into arts and crafts furniture, including plugs, brackets and the mechanical joints used with making bread board ends. He looks forward to sharing his experience and knowledge to anyone interested in taking their woodworking to the next level.

President's Comments.

Program – Class of Shellac finishing by Phil Choquette

Phil gave a great class on Shellac (theme – 'Shellac is Our Friend'). Some take aways from the class were:

Shellac must only be thinned with denatured alcohol.

Some of the advantages of Shellac are: Non-toxic; User friendly; Dries quickly with very low VOCs; Can tint and color Shellac as needed; Can cover Shellac with any type of finish except water base finishes. Some of the dis-advantages of Shellac are: Rejects other finishes if not dewaxed (if you mix your own, you will have difficulty getting rid of wax); The finish is a little soft on the hardness scale; You can 'only' store Shellac about 3 years; Shellac will attack bare metal.

Andy Rudy showed a shop-built variable angle vise that he had made out of a bowling ball and a small tire. He hacksawed the top off the bowling ball and glued the vice to that surface. He then obtained a used small tire. Setting the bowling ball in the tire allowed the vice to be set at any angle and provide a stable clamp. Pretty neat, Andy!

David Shull showed a jewelry cabinet made out of cherry and figured maple. He got the figured maple from Oby at Targo Woods in Bellingham for \$5 per board. The Cabinet was a present for his girl friend. Great job, David. Jerry Haynes made a toy doll crib out of cedar and finished it with white paint. Great gift for the little ones, Jerry.

Val Mathews displayed a toy Bi-plane prototype for the Toys for Tots program. He is looking for volunteers especially in the Whatcom County area to set up Toy building dates.

Bill Baer put together a rustic chair out of Maple and Cedar using through tenons and wedges. The Chair is a great example of what you can build without a lot of machining.

Greg Koenker showed an end table that he had made out of Sapele and Figured Maple veneer. It was a beautiful piece. Way to go, Greg.

Bob Gaubatz also showed an end table constructed out of quarter sawnWhite Oak and Ebony. He used stain and polyurethane to finish it. Looks great, Bob. Ken Grays showed a towel rack that had been constructed out of Black Walnut and Hickory. It was a neat use of the wood.

Jerry Couchman displayed a coffee table that he had constructed out of recycled 1950's Rosewood and Peruvian Walnut as part of a Dining Room table project for a client. It was finished with Shellac, oil varnish and wax. It looked fantastic.

Jerry Couchman also displayed a small Rosewood and Cherry Box that he made out of left over material from the table. Again, it was finished with Shellac, oil varnish and wax. It was a really fine example of box making art.

HERMAN EHRLICH

Club member Herman Ehrlich passed away on December 28th. He was 91. Born in Germany in 1922, his family escaped Germany and fled to China following the rise of the Nazi party. Herman worked as a cabinet maker for many years in China before emigrating to the US. He lived in several states and in British Columbia but finally settled in Bellingham in the 1960s. In 1968 he started the business Pacific Impressions which sold supplies for printers to businesses all over Northwestern Washington. He ran that business for more than 40 years, retiring in 2011. He continued woodworking and was in the process of organizing his shop and repairing his kitchen cabinets last year. Survived by his son, Fred, daughter-in-law Daveen, and three grandchildren, Katie, Josef, and Ian. Herman had an eventful life, filled with adventure, family, some tragedy, hard work, and lots of woodworking.

BOARD MEETING

Andrew Pellar convened the NCWA Board meeting at 7:00 p.m. on February 12, 2014 at the Farmhouse Restaurant in Edison.

The minutes of the February general Meeting were reviewed and revised.

<u>Woodfest.</u> Phil Choquette reminded everyone that Woodfest will be 5,6 April Geary Greenleaf indicated that he had six people sign up to display project at the Woodfest so far. After discussion, a decision was made to rent a large space (10x20?) for display of the projects. It was also decided to award a Lie Nielsen block plane by the NCWA to the student project determined to be 'best in show' by the NCWA participating members. Discussion followed on renaming the award. Decision was made to rename it NCSQ 2014 Woodfest Award.

Phil also indicated that he had reserved the Burlington Mall for a NCWA display on Father's Day.

Shop Tours. John Bellinger indicated that they had six shops signed up for the Shop Tours on 15 March. This was followed by a discussion of the Fall Shop Tour. General consensus of the board was that NCWA should try to have the fall tour on Camano Island.

<u>Magazine Subscriptions.</u> Andrew Pellar indicated that he was able to get 10 people to sign up for a discounted Taunton press subscription or extension. The NCWA will pay Taunton and members who signed up for the subscriptions will send a check to Al Ashley made out to NCWA.

<u>New Business.</u> Al Ashley discussed the budget. After input from some of the board members, he will modify the budget to reflect changes in the Newsletter expense, the library expense, and the membership card expenses. A motion was made by Ed Pysher seconded by Jerry Anderson to adopt the revised budget. Motion was adopted unanimously.

Jerry Anderson gave a report on the Education Committee.

He indicated that the Marking and Measuring Class was very successful. Both Al Ashley and Don Wilkins indicated that they had taken the class and found it very rewarding.

Steve Durkee will be giving a two-session class on Inlay techniques. The first class will be theory and basic techniques. The second class will be hands-on practice.

Jerry Couchman's Box class will be in May.

A general discussion about class sign-up policy was initiated by the Board. Consensus of the board was that initial sign up for a class will be at a General Meeting 3 months prior to the scheduled class date. Following the General Meeting, sign-ups will be on the NCWA website.

Andrew Pellar initiated a discussion about the lack of class instructors and proposed some solutions. Jerry Anderson indicated that he would take Andrew's suggestions to the Education Committee which was already working on establishing an annual set of classes. There was general agreement that the club needed to offer more beginning woodworking classes.

Jerry Anderson indicated that the Education Committee was looking for help to input class information on the website.

<u>Programs.</u> Jerry Couchman indicated that he needed someone to pick up the NCWA club bench from his shop to support the March general meeting as he would not be in town at that time. Jerry will call Val Mathews and see if Val can bring his own bench to the meeting. If he cannot, Geary Greenleaf will assist.

The March Newsletter needs to have a reminder that the April General Meeting will be at the Burlington Library instead of the Hillcrest Lodge. The lodge is being used by the Tulip festival.

Chris and Holly Barbo will be giving the April meeting program. Chris and Holly run a custom furniture business in Bellingham.

May will be an "Old project do over". Members will indicate how they would redo an old project based on lessons learned.

June will be a Mixed Media Challenge. Members will be encouraged to bring projects that incorporate other materials with wood.

<u>Newsletter.</u> There was a general consensus that Herman Ehrlich should be remembered for his life in the newsletter. <u>Nomination for Vice President.</u> The Board discussed nominating anyone <u>not</u> wearing a nametag at the next general meeting for the position of Vice President.
