Meet Jamie Fell

Jamie Fell is from Perth, Australia and wound up in Eastern Washington through an agricultural exchange program. When he met the love of his life, he stayed. In his professional life, he operated a fencing business for some time then became interested in carpentry. He went through a carpentry apprentice program in Mt Vernon, then, as a member of the local carpentry union, he worked as a foreman for two commercial contractors in the Bellingham area. Sadly, he was forced to retire early as a result of a stroke in 2012. That's when he started woodworking to keep his mind and hands as active as possible. His shop in Ferndale is very well equipped and he currently has some very nice furniture projects in progress. In addition to the basics, he also has a full sized CNC machine which has expanded the complexity of projects that he can do. He learned about NCWA through Tom Dolese when he took some of Tom's classes. Jamie is looking forward to learning how to make boxes so I think I'll get to spend more time with him!





Meet Ivan Schierling

Ivan Schierling was exposed to woodworking at an early age growing up in Oakland, CA. In addition to a school shop class, his grandfather and a family friend were important influences. His degree is in math and had planed on becoming a teacher, but his passion is in Japanese woodworking and joinery and teaching children about woodworking. While he was still in the Oakland area, he enrolled in the Zen Joinery Apprenticeship program under Paul Discoe to learn Japanese joinery and hand tool use. He also participated in an EcoNest Japanese timber framing workshop to further his woodworking skills. He is a member of Kezuroukai USA, an organization dedicated to the preservation and transmission of traditional Japanese hand tool carpentry techniques, and even made a trip to Japan for one of their conventions. After volunteering with Kids Carpentry in Seattle, originally founded in Berkeley, CA, he realized that teaching kids about woodworking was important to him. He currently works at Grizzly in the Bellingham store, but his long term goals include setting up a woodworking business with a shop that includes teaching. He plans to participate in the November Shop Talk session in Whatcom County by demonstrating sharpening techniques.

SHARP, SHARPER, SHARPEST!

What would happen if you asked 8 different woodworkers about sharpening? Well, we did.

At the latest SHOP TALK session, graciously hosted by Jerry Couchman, 8 members demonstrated their sharpening methods for members from Whatcom County.

Each sharpener set up a station and demonstrated how they sharpen their various tools. Members were encouraged to bring in their tools and several did. You could visit each station and see the methods to sharpen tools, ask questions, and try them out.

Dave Blair used ceramic stones for general sharpening and shaped hones for carving tools. Andrew Pellar used sand paper on glass to sharpen chisels and card scrapers. David Shull sharpened hand saws. Mike Chaplin and Mike Titus had different Tormek systems. Rick Anderson brought his Work Sharp. David Helm used diamond lapping film to sharpen straight and curved tools. And Ivan Schierling used Waterstones to sharpen Japanese tools.

Talk about one stop shopping. Where else could you see all such a variety of sharpening methods being demonstrated all in one place? Thanks to one and all who participated in making this a success. Andrew Pellar

NCWA Board of Directors Meeting November 15, 2017

- The Meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. by President Dave Strauss.
- Members Present: David Shull Jerry Anderson, Dale Brandland, George Knutson, Bill Rawls, David Vandette, Sascha Vandette, Jim Redding, Mike Caplin, Charley Drake, John Braun, Phil Choquette, Dave Strauss.
- Treasurer's Report (sent by Al Ashley in abstentia): Checking acct: \$4,463.43, Savings acct: \$3,402.92. Current membership: 220 (compared to 198 last year at this time).
- Programs and Shows Committee Report:
 - o Gary Danilson sent information on Christmas party. The lodge no longer has a piano. Aside from that, the party will be similar to last year's event.
 - o This is an event for members only, no guests. New member should attend in January.
 - o Needs a head count. Will send invitations shortly.
- Tool raffle discussion
 - o It was moved to increase the tool raffle budget to \$900. This change in budget will be discussed more at the next BOD meeting.
 - Name tags will be required to participate in the tool raffle.
- Bill Rawls discussed professional woodworkers to be invited to present at club meetings next year.
 - o He is in the process of contacting four professional woodworkers
 - o So far, one commitment, one tentative, two likely presenters
 - The BOD agreed that an honorarium of \$200 would be appropriate, unless Bill can negotiate a cheaper rate.
 - o Other programs next year will feature club members
 - o Some planned programs: Jim Bucknell "Tips and Tricks", Tom Dolese, George Knutson, Jerry Couchman, along with a few professionals from outside the club including Seth Roland.
- Dale Brandland discussed the Whatcom County shoptalk. 30 people attended. The meeting focused on sharpening techniques. Dale encouraged other regions to organize similar small or hands-on gatherings.
- Mike Chaplin discussed the strategic planning meetings that have been occurring and identified five areas for improvement or for focusing effort: communication, member participation, Monthly meetings, Diversity of woodworking experience, General club structure.
- Mike Titus (in abstentia) and club web site: Four members are helping to improve online presence (Mike, Bill Rawls, Greg Koenker, and John Bellinger). They are meeting to consider improvements and expansion of the NCWA web site.
- Elections: All positions are filled or have members who have agreed to run.
- Jerry Anderson discussed presented information from the education committee. Plans to offer more project-based and perhaps multiple date classes.
- Dave Vandette discussed upcoming shows. Woodfest: April 14-15th.
- The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 PM
