NCWA General Meeting Notes - February 6, 2018

NCWA President Dale Brandland called the meeting to order at 7 PM and new members and guests were introduced. New board members Sascha Vandette and Kent Crouse were also introduced.

Gary Danilson reported that the library has old books for sale at \$1 each and that membership cards are ready for pick-up. The club cancelled our discount arrangements with Hartville Tool and Woodworkers Supply due to concerns about member privacy. After polling the members in attendance at the meeting about continuing the previous arrangement with these companies, Gary decided to look into how interested members could continue to receive a discount. Only those members that wish to participate in the online discount programs will have their information sent to these vendors.

Sascha Vandette requested that members sign up to participate in Woodfest. Members who sign up to participate in Woodfest will be entered to win a home-cooked dinner for four!

John Braun presented certificates from the U.S. Marine Corps to members who participated in making Toys for Tots.

Jerry Anderson mentioned that the basic tablesaw class (Feb 17th) is a prerequisite for advanced tablesaw.

Mike Titus, NCWA webmaster, updated the membership on webpage upgrades, including a future discussion forum.

Bring and brag:

- Jim Redding displayed a hall table made from curly big leaf maple with a cherry base. He also showed off a woodcut block print.
- Judy Bekker and Steve Wagoner showed off lovely woodblock prints using methods they learned in Jim Redding's woodblock print-making class.
- Kirk Ratajesak presented a cross and rose carving he executed on a wooden urn.
- Nancy Andersen showed off a remarkably detailed birdcage scrollsawn from 1/8" Baltic birch plywood. The biggest challenge: Being crazy enough to start a project with this many parts.
- David Shull presented five bowls he recently turned, two from spalted birch, two from madrone, and one from cedar.
- Gene Radermacher brought a white oak urn with black walnut bands.
- David Helm showed off a low table he built from figured bigleaf maple with claro walnut butterfly keys. He finished it with Sam Maloof oil and paste wax.
- Jeff Palmer showed off his birch and cedar box with dovetail keys that he made in Jerry Couchman's box making class.
- Bill Rawls brought a table he built from 100-year old oak.
- Tom Howorth discussed a plane wick he built from maple to hold a piece of paraffin for waxing the base of a handplane.

After the break, several t-shirts and squares were raffled.

Main program: Tom Dolese introduced the guest speaker, Seth Rolland. Seth lives, woodworks and teaches in Port Townsend, WA. Seth presented his spectacular body of work. Educational Program News

Comments from last years Strategic Planning Committee meetings showed that while club members generally liked the classes offered by the educational program, they also had some frustration with the difficulty of getting into classes. A few weeks ago, the educational committee, along with most of this year's teaching team, had a meeting to discuss ways in which we could improve the situation. Some of the approaches we plan to try include the following:

- Using the standby list (on the sign up sheets) to identify classes that are not only full, but have a significant number of club members who are interested in getting into the class. For those classes with large standby lists, we will contact the instructor and see if they are willing to teach an additional session of the class, giving members another chance to get into the class. Note: the standby list serves two purposes, first is to have a club member ready to step in if one of the people signed up for the class finds they can not make it, and second to serve as a gauge of interest in the class so that we know which classes need additional sessions. For this second reason, please sign up on the standby list even if there are numerous names ahead of you... let us know the demand is there!
- We also plan, where possible, to offer several different classes on a given day so that more class slots are available. While it may not make the most popular classes easier to get into, it will offer alternatives and hopefully spread out the demand a bit.
- Some people commented that Saturday classes are difficult for them to attend, so we will try to offer a number of mid week classes, some in the afternoon and others in the evening.
- Recognizing that many of our classes only take 4-5 students per session, we also plan to develop some classes that will be demonstration only, and as such will allow a larger number of people to attend.

Some of these approaches will be tried in the current educational year (ending in mid-June), but expect others to begin in the next educational calendar, beginning in September. Please understand that we have a limited number of instructors and many of them teach multiple classes. Offering more sessions and classes increases the load on them, so please consider the possibility of teaching a class yourself. You may not feel qualified, but we can help you by picking out a suitable class and letting you serve as an assistant in that class until you are ready to teach it yourself. If however you have an idea for a class that you already feel experienced enough to teach, please come talk to Greg Koenker or Jerry Anderson at a meeting, or give us a call, or email, and we can discuss it.

NCWA Brief History

A BRIEF HISTORY OF NCWA

BEGINNINGS: NCWA was formed in 1984 when two Skagit County woodworkers, Asher Cohen and Gary Arentzen, decided "It would be cool to get together with other woodworkers and share ideas." Initially, the group only included 6 members, but it didn't take long for the word to spread. Meetings were held in each other's shops and when it was your turn, you had to demonstrate or discuss something you were good at.

They held their first public woodworking show in the Sedro-Woolley Forest Service facility. Many initial members were serious woodworkers striving to be professional woodworkers and others had professional lives, but enjoyed making and selling their work. Many were furniture or cabinet makers, but there were also carvers, turners and even a chain saw carver (Rocky MacArthur.) By 1987, membership was about 25. Of those, Ray deVries is the only current member.

In 1986, the club went to the La Conner Arts Alive event and our participation was featured in the Skagit Valley Herald. The following year, NCWA formed Artwood, an art cooperative in Bellingham. The initial location was on Grand Ave, and was shared with a small coffee shop and other tenants. After less than a year, a better location in Fairhaven became available. The original NCWA group realized they needed more artists to make Artwood viable as a business, so several non-members were invited to join the group. After lots of work, they opened the new Artwood on Harris Ave in May of 1988.

SHOWS THROUGH THE YEARS: The club continued showing at Arts Alive, and in 1990, also did a show in The Depot Gallery during the Anacortes Arts and Crafts Festival. In 1997, a group from NCWA organized a "Fine Wooding Event" in downtown Sedro-Woolley in front of Main St businesses. That evolved into WoodFest which has continued as an annual event. In 1998, WoodFest moved to Sedro-Woolley High School and former member Mike Stewart, Sedro-Woolley High School wood shop teacher was invited to include his students' projects in the show. Eventually, Mike became chairman of the event and worked to prevent woodworking programs from being eliminated from high school curriculums. From then on, woodworking classes from many local high schools have been competing. NCWA helped judge the event for several years.

The La Conner Arts Alive venue for NCWA eventually moved to the Garden Club, an old Grange building on Second St. NCWA shared that facility with the Northwest Washington Woodturners (NWW) and remained there until 2009 when asked to find another venue. Two vacant shops were tried with mixed success and our final show there was held in the La Conner Retirement Inn in 2016.

When we vacated the Garden Club, Jim Bucknell organized our first Burlington Cascade Mall show. We did shows there from 2011-2015. We then returned to Anacortes doing live demonstrations at the Anacortes Arts Fest and have received \$300 each year for that effort. WoodFest and the Anacortes Arts Fest are currently our only annual shows.

CLUB MEETINGS AND PROGRAMS: In the early 90's membership declined and the club nearly folded, probably because professional members were spending most of their time trying to make money at Artwood. Fortunately, they conducted a membership recruitment drive and saved the club. Gary Holloman, Al Stratton and Ray deVries remained active and Bob Doop did a lot to stimulate and bring new energy to the club. Al Stratton started the club library and also taught woodturning. There were other informal education sessions in member shops.

Other members who joined in the 90's are mentionable because they are still current members and have made many contributions to the club; Val and Laura Matthews, and "Low Tech" Phil Choquette. Phil was very instrumental in organizing our participation in many of our woodworking shows and also brought the monthly "Bring and Brag" sessions to a new level with jig ideas. Val and Laura have hosted the annual picnic at their place since 2002. Mike Larvia followed by Gene Benson and Val started the Toys for Tots program in 2003, and over the years, many club members have participated in making wooden toys in support of the Marine Corp Reserve Toys for Tots program. Val is also one of the club's most active instructors.

In 1996, there were enough Woodturners to start their own club, the Northwest Washington Woodturners, although several turners maintain memberships in both clubs.

In 2000, Ed Pysher joined the club and would become one of the prime movers in the club, especially with the education program and welcoming new members. He went on to hold nearly every position on the Board including Treasurer, Vice President, President, Education Chair, and Membership Chair.

In 2003, President Nick Van instituted separate NCWA board meetings to free up membership meeting time for woodworking presentations and discussion.

In 2004, the NCWA board, under President Rick Anderson, decided to relocate meetings from member shops to the Hillcrest Lodge in Mt Vernon starting in 2005. Monthly meetings now include Bring and Brag, Library checkout, tool raffles, class sign up, presentations on woodworking by guest speakers and club members and a chance to socialize and discuss woodworking. To fill the gap from the loss of shop meetings, semi-annual shop tours were also added in 2005.

Since membership has shifted from professionals to mostly hobbyists with a wide range of abilities, our education program has evolved with experienced members teaching beginning skills and other woodworking subjects. Instructors help beginners to safely gain basic skills more quickly and provide new learning opportunities for all members. Education is one of the most important benefits in the club.

SPECIAL RECOGNITION: Fine Woodworking Design Book Five, 1990, features an article on the start of Artwood by NCWA and included information about Michael Strong, Vernon Leibrant, Lance and Karen Howell and Jim Hume. Jim Hume also authored an article in Home Furniture in 1996 on his modern version of a Windsor rocker done in Mahogany and was invited to turn an ornament for the Clinton White House Christmas tree. At least three NCWA members have been featured in Fine Woodworking Magazine. Former member Tony Konovaloff wrote three articles, "A Cabinetmaker's Tool Chest", # 90 (1991), "Glazing Cabinet Doors", #116 (1996) and "Housed Sliding Dovetails", #123 (1997). Cec Braeden wrote the article "Rock Solid Plywood Bench", #181 (2006). Tom Dolese authored the article "Strategies for Making a Living Building Furniture" in 2014 and his settle was also featured in #247 in the Readers Gallery section. Jack McKee has written two books: Woodshop for Kids and Builder Boards: How to Build a Set of Notched Boards Children Can Use. Former member Jay Smith was commissioned to build a 56' replica of a Viking ship, and his 36' Viking ship version was launched in 2017.

NCWA Board of Directors Meeting - February 14 2018

- The meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. by President Dale Brandland at The Farmhouse Restaurant in Mount Vernon.
- Board Members present: Dale Brandland, George Knutson, Dave Strauss, Al Ashley, Phil Choquette, Sascha Vandette, David Vandette, Bill Rawls, Greg Koenker, Gary Danilson, John Braun, Kent Crouse, and Mike Chaplin.
- Other NCWA members present: Jim Bucknell, and Andrew Pellar.
- Dale shared info from Jerry Anderson on a special presentation that's been offered to NCWA members by furniture maker Stuart Welch. In addition to the discounted tickets made available to NCWA members for the 2:00 to 4:00 presentation on March 10th at the Skagit County Historical Museum's "Old Time Tools and New-Fangled Furniture: Woodworking......A Process" Exhibit, Stuart has offered to join us at 4:30 in the display area and explain details of craftsmanship and joinery of various pieces that the general public may not understand or appreciate.
- A couple suggestions were discussed for the Tool Raffle that Dale will share with Tom and Greg for future meetings.
- David Vandette made a request that NCWA contribute \$250 to become an official sponsor of Woodfest 2018. Numerous benefits were pointed out including significant publicity and visibility through the Skagit Valley Tulip Festival's extensive advertising. This year is the 20th anniversary of Woodfest, which was started by the members of NCWA!! Motion made by David Vandette, seconded by Phil Choquette. Passed by unanimous vote.
- Al Ashley gave the Treasurer's Report
 - Total bank account balances (checking and savings) \$6,580.18
 - The 2018 revised budget was distributed to the board.
 - o Current membership totals, dropped members, and new members to date were provided.
 - A list of members who haven't renewed their memberships will be provided by Al to Dale Brandland, George Knutson, and Gary Danilson who will contact those people and ask them to share why they've chosen to not renew (for future planning purposes).
