ON-LINE VENDOR DISCOUNT PROGRAM

The on-line vendor discount program will be re-activated later this month.

Earlier this year the club temporarily suspended our on-line vendor discount program with Hartville Tool and Woodworker's Supply. The Board has reviewed the program with these vendors and believes that both vendors employ reasonable business practices to protect each member's personal information. Both vendors will allow our club to again participate in their woodworking club discount program and only require that the club provide a list of members names and mailing addresses. These vendors will no longer require a member's phone number and email address to participate.

The club is currently exploring other on-line vendors that offer discounts to woodworking clubs. Any future on-line vendor must provide NCWA with assurance that they employ reasonable business practices to protect each member's personal information. They must also agree to limit the member information to the name and address on any list provided by NCWA.

NCWA BOD Meeting Notes

NCWA Board of Directors Meeting April 11, 2018

- The meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. by President Dale Brandland at the Farmhouse Restaurant in Mt. Vernon.
- Members Present: Tim Wynn, Al Ashely, Dale Brandland, Sascha Vandette, David Vandette, Bill Rawls, John Braun, Jerry Anderson, Dave Strauss, Greg Koenker, Kent Crouse, Ray deVries, Phil Choquette.
- Others Present: Jane Wynn
- Treasurer's Report.
 - o Al Ashley stated that NCWA had \$5,577.48 in the checking and savings accounts. The club had a total of 203 members as of April 11, 2018 compared to 190 members at this time last year. We have had a total of 20 new members in 2018 so far.
 - o Al led a discussion on the storage unit. Our current unit is managed by Affordable Storage who has notified us that our rental fee will be increased by \$5/mo. to a total of \$55/mo. effective May 2, 2018. Everyone agreed we still needed a storage unit with indications that we could use a larger unit. We will be looking for alternate options that are readily accessible for club events.
- Al reported that we have 5 people had signed up for the Mary May carving demonstration to date.
- Dale Brandland led a discussion on the NCWA newsletter. He stated that the purpose of the discussion was to find a way to reduce the workload on the editor (Jane Wynn) while at the same time perhaps expanding it and making it more useable. After an extensive discussion, it was agreed that Jane would meet with Mike Titus and his website group to coordinate their efforts.
- Toys for Tots.
 - o The BOD discussed changing the format of the November meeting. Thoughts included changing the Bring & Brag to reflect examples of the toys that were being made and highlighting the members that contributed to the program.
- WoodFest.
 - o Sascha and David Vandette reviewed preparations for the WoodFest.
 - o The setup will be on Friday, April 13 from 5-7 p.m.
 - o They passed around a schedule highlighting the demonstrations and the members manning the booth.
- Al Ashley reviewed the Vendor program and highlighted concerns about member privacy. After discussion, it was decided to adopt an opt out mechanism for NCWA members. Any member wishing to 'opt out' would have their name taken off the information provided to the vendors. Only member names and addresses would be provided to on-line vendors. Vendors would not be provided email addresses or phone numbers.
- Al proposed that we add Kingspor as a vendor. The BOD concurred.
- Dale Brandland indicated that we got some good criticism on the April Meeting. How do we encourage this type of productive criticism? At that point, the BOD provided examples of lively criticism to him as examples which he appreciated very much.
- Membership Program. Gary Danilson was not present but provided input to the BOD prior via email prior to the meeting.
 - o We will need to redo the brochure. Sascha Vandette indicated that it was a great mechanism to get new members. We have handed out many brochures at both WoodFest and Anacortes Arts Festival. Jerry Couchman has already started design work for the new brochure.
 - Beads of Courage. Gary indicated over 40 members have signed up to participate in the program.
 - o December program. Gary indicated that we will need someone else to volunteer to manage this program this year. Extended discussion by the BOD highlighted the following points:
 - The Christmas Party will not happen unless we get a volunteer to manage it within the next couple of months. (Some BOD members opined that if we did not get a volunteer in May that we should cancel it.)
 - We should strongly consider cancelling the raffle as part of the event. Al Ashley invested over 80 hours planning and
 organizing the raffle last year. This does not include the efforts of other members to identify and get vendor/member
 donations.
 - Dave Strauss pointed out that all this effort went for a party that only had a participation of roughly 50 members out of 200 in the NCWA. In addition, that number was almost at the limit that the Mt. Vernon Hill Crest Lodge can accommodate considering the spouses and guests that members bring with them. If we tried to get more participation we would probably have to move the venue. Was there a disconnect between the number we could accommodate and the size of the membership now?
- Ray deVries indicated that he is trying to line up Phil Lowe for a class. Phil is the owner and director of his own woodworking school, the Furniture Institute of Massachusetts as well as a frequent contributor to Fine Woodworking. After discussion, it was agreed that this would be good to pursue if we could piggy-back off an event that Phil was attending on the West Coast. There was a general consensus that we could not afford to pay his entire travel expenses and speakers fee for a one time presentation to our club.
- Education Committee. Jerry Anderson indicated that the Education Committee felt that we should change the fee structure of the classes based on advice from NCWA member, David Knowles, a retired tort attorney. The committee felt that they should change the fee structure to allow each instruction to charge 'verifiable materials cost' for the class. Tim Wynn moved and Al Ashley seconded a motion to effect that recommendation from the Education Committee. Extensive discussion ensued. Many members of the board felt the need for additional information and input. As a consequence, Tim Wynn withdrew his motion. The matter will be discussed at the next board meeting.
- The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.
