

The September presentation will explain what **kumiko** is, give examples of how it can be used, and demonstrate how it's made. Tom Howorth will step through the entire process and show the tools and jigs that he uses. In addition, he will provide a list of references for those that would like to learn more. Kumiko is a delicate and sophisticated technique of assembling wooden pieces without the use of nails. Thinly slit wooden pieces are grooved, punched and mortised, and then fitted individually using a plane, saw, chisel and other tools to make fine adjustments. The technique was developed in Japan in the Asuka Era (600-700 AD), and has since been refined and passed down through generations of craftsmen who are passionate about the tradition of Kumiko.

ZOOM Instructions

How to Access ZOOM for September 8th Meeting

Thanks to those of you who have been attending the Zoom Meetings. The feedback has been excellent, and building on that momentum, we look forward to another wonderful virtual presentation this month.

Our September 8th meeting will revert to our regular schedule with a short business meeting, including Bring & Brag, followed by the presentation.

Prior to the meeting, NCWA members are welcomed to login to Zoom beginning at 6:30 PM to allow some time for those wanting or needing to get familiar with the Zoom format before the meeting begins at 7:00 PM.

Tom's presentation will include about 15 minutes of Q & A time included in the hour.

The invitation to join details were/will be sent to you in a separate email

As a refresher...a couple of tips and/or things to be aware of for Zoom meetings...

At 6:30 PM the Zoom host (King Dahl) will mute everyone's microphones. This will eliminate background noise that can come over your mic inadvertently, even if you are not speaking.

There are two buttons to be aware of at the bottom of your screen - the Participants Button and the Chat Button. Depending on whether you are using a Mac, PC, iPad, iPhone, or other device, the buttons may be in slightly different locations.

Clicking the Participants Button allows you to view a list of all NCWA members that have joined the Zoom meeting. It also allows you to click a button to "Raise your hand" if you'd like to be unmuted to speak or ask a question. Using this "Raise your hand" feature helps avoid confusion and the potential of people talking over each other.

The Chat Button allows you to chat/text to a specific person during the meeting, privately, or you can send a message to everyone in attendance. Anytime during the presentation, if you have a question for the presenter, **Chat it to NCWA Wood (that goes to the host, King Dahl)** and he will forward it to the presenter at the appropriate time. We will do our best to get as many questions answered as possible.

Lastly, if for any reason, your internet drops you from the meeting, re-click the invitation link to re-join. Everyone's internet service is a bit different, with some better than others, so we hope your service will allow a pleasant viewing and participatory experience for you.

We look forward to our Virtual NCWA Monthly Meeting on September 8th.

President's Message

The Covid-19 virus will apparently be around for a while. And that means it will be a while before the NCWA can return to normal. That is why the Board has been working to find ways to continue to provide valuable woodworking services to our members. We have been able to get some great presenters for the last few meetings and the September meeting should also be great with Tom Howorth (a member) presenting on Kumiko. And Phil Humphries and the Programs Committee are hard at work filling the calendar for the rest of the year and into 2021.

The Education Committee, under the skilled leadership of Greg Koenker, is continuing to develop videos for the Virtual Shop Talks (VSTs) as a way of making up for the lack of classes. The VSTs showcase a specific tool or woodworking process with a time for Q & A and then the meeting is opened up for anyone to ask questions to everyone on the Zoom call about anything related to woodworking. The goal is to provide us all with an opportunity for more social interaction between our members and reclaim at least some of the social aspects of the NCWA that are such an important part of why we all love this club.

Because we have not been meeting and conducting business as usual, we have had reduced expenses and that, in turn, has allowed us to reach out and get speakers that are making presentations via Zoom and that we would not normally be able to afford. So, I guess SOME good has come from all of the disruption.

Under normal conditions, Al Ashley begins collecting dues in October for the following year and continues to collect at our monthly meetings until "last call" in March. At that point, we know how much money has been raised by our dues. Assuming that the virus will continue to prevent us from resuming our historic activities, the Board is beginning our budget development for 2021. The uncertainty surrounding the virus will provide for some interesting decision making but we will work to remain flexible to adapt to changing conditions and be prepared for whatever awaits us in 2021.

Al Ashley has established a process where we can use PayPal to pay our dues for 2021. Al will provide details but this will allow us to pay via credit card if you wish to do so. You will still have the option of sending Al a check to delivering cash to him but this process has reportedly worked well for the Turner's club.

Here's my unabashed marketing plea. I think the annual dues of \$35 remains an incredibly good deal. While we all miss the in-person meetings, classes, shop tours, shows etc., we have been able to provide presentations by very skilled woodworkers via Zoom and we plan to continue providing you with a mix of non-member and member presenters in the coming months. Combined with the VSTs that are coming, I think there is still a lot to be gained by being a member of NCWA. And I haven't even mentioned the value of access to our library. And then, of course, there is our vendor discounts. And if that isn't enough, there is still the comradery between our members as we deal with each other over the phone or via Zoom or in socially-distanced settings. So, there you have it. That's why I think the \$35 is still a good deal. I hope you do too. The reality is that the more of us that choose to pay our dues for 2021, the more we will be able to continue to provide the services necessitated by the virus and, if possible, to resume to normal functions when that is possible. Thanks, and I hope your name will still be on the 2021 NCWA roster.

Al Ashley – Treasure Report –

Checking \$2,305.02

Savings \$7,415.74

Total \$9,720.76 (prior year \$7,772.99)

Membership – 231, 18 new members for 2020, 6 Honorary members

2021 membership dues will have a PayPal Option in the email

Bill Library – There have been 2 past Curb side events but only a few people checked out items. We realize the library is only an asset if people use it. So instead of using money to buy new books we will use funds to mail books to members. Starting in October members can request books/dvds (still for a 2 month checkout period) and we'll mail them to their home. Then they can mail them back or make arrangements with one of the several drop of locations to get the books/dvds returned. We estimate \$25-50 in mailing expenses for 5 orders a month. This will give a timely access for members to receive material and unlimited opportunity for them more time to request material. One disadvantage is we are paying mailing fees and members are paying to possibly return material. Another disadvantage is less funds for new materials and potential damage to material while traveling through the USPS. However the Pros is that Brannon is willing to get books to members quicker. We'll try it for October and November and see how it works.
