DRIVING INSTRUCTIONS: **From the North**, take the Bow Hill Exit at the Skagit Casino. Follow Bow Hill Rd. west for a mile or so and take a left on Ershig Rd. Continue south to the bottom of the hill and over the RR tracks. First driveway on the right. **From the South**, take Chuckanut Drive exit and follow it to Allen where you will cross the Samish River bridge, take an immediate right onto Ershig Rd., and follow it for a mile and a half. Driveway is on the left just before the RR tracks. **From Anacortes**, travel highway #20 to the Avon Allen Rd., turn left and follow it around the hill and across the flat to the intersection with Allen West Rd. Jog to the right and catch a left on Chuckanut to the Samish River bridge. Make an immediate right onto Ershig Rd. Follow that for a mile and a half. Driveway is on the left, just before the RR tracks.

Monthly Meeting of July 10, 2007

It was a surprisingly large turnout for a summer's monthly meeting when NCWA members gathered at Hillcrest Lodge in Mount Vernon on Tuesday night, July 10, to see and hear the various methods others used in constructing drawers for their wood projects. The program followed the usual hour-long business meeting.

President Ed Pysher called for an introduction of guests and three men responded with the promise of becoming our new members. Pysher then discussed the need for committee manpower and the opportunities and satisfaction of volunteer

work on one of the many committees that keep the organization in operation. He announced that a new Vendors' Discounts Committee was being formed to increase member privileges for lower prices on wood, tools, and other woodworking materials. The Club enjoys discounted buying (usually 10 percent off retail prices) from a half-dozen local area merchants and will make a concerted effort to enroll others in the program. The Club, in turn, will publicize these resources and urge its members to take advantage of the lower pricing. Merchants will also have the advantage of free advertising in the Club Newsletter. Volunteers are needed.

New Editor Search. Ed again told the membership that the one-person Newsletter Committee chaired by Editor Rick Anderson needs a volunteer. Anderson originally undertook the job for a promised two-year

stint, but it's now approaching three. He has stated his retirement date will follow the December 2007 issue. "So," Pysher said, "the need is getting critical."

(Editor's Note: At the Board meeting which followed on Wednesday, July 18, Nick Van, former president and 2007 Activities Chairman, has volunteered to accept the new Editor's post for a similar two-year period. The Board also approved the prompt acquisition of publishing software so that Nick can start his training in time for the January takeover. It's Picnic time!

It's Silent Auction Time Too!

There will be a silent auction tool swap at the picnic event. For those of you who have never participated in a silent auction, the rules are pretty simple. The seller displays the item for sale with a sales sheet that lists the item, the sellers description of the item condition (e.g. new; works good; needs repair; etc), the seller's name, and minimum allowable bid, if the seller wishes to state one. Anyone interested in buying the item writes down the amount they wish to bid for the item and their name. Anyone else interested in the item can overbid by writing their bid amount and their name on the sheet. Normally, bids should advance by at least 10% over the previous highest bid. Check back often to see if you are still the highest bidder. The highest bidder at the sale cutoff time wins the item, if their bid exceeds the stated minimum bid. The buyer should then pay the seller for the item and take possession. **Bring items you wish to sell* along with the silent auction bid sheet (attached). Also, ***bring money and/or a checkbook***. You never know what might show up for sale!*

The half-round furniture piece features a bent wood front with three tapered, outward-bowed legs exquisite in design and workmanship. He noted that the finish is made up of sixteen coats of tung oil. Phil Choquette, who was our design and wood joinery speaker at two previous meetings offered a critique of Jim's effort: "The flared legs," he said, "gives the table balance. Had Jim designed it with straight legs up and down it would have looked top heavy."



Comparing Members' Drawer Styles Is A Fresh Approach to Learning

Drawers, wood ones, not the kind you wear, was the theme of the July meeting and sponsors Cec Braeden and Bob Doop put on quite a show of them. Ten wood drawers, all different in some joinery respects, were lined up on tables to be viewed and their details made public by their creators. From simple joinery to more complex and showy dovetails, they all had been used as drawers in the shops and homes of our members. The collection included four different styles from Doop and two by Nick Van, with single entries by Jim Bucknell, Dave Blair, and Shelly Close. Larry Tomovick submitted a corner sample of one of his recent bedroom furniture pieces.

Basically a box with a handle, drawers can have added features for good looks and a better fit-and-finish joinery system. We were viewing them out of context, so to speak.

The stand or carcass was left at home so we didn't have the opportunity of seeing them in their true environment. But they all looked fine and their makers gave us a few comments on how they were constructed, the tools they used, and some of the problems encountered. As with most volunteer, off-the-cuff presenters, informative and detailed steps in construction were skimpy. There were no notes or diagrams handed out and the final product hid the inner construction. Since corner joints were visible most of the speakers dwelled on their choice of equipment to make dovetails and finger joints.

Jim Bucknell led off the discussion with a nice appearing drawer with neat dovetails at the corners. He described at some length how to make dovetails with the Keller jig, a tool he is happy to promote. His description of how to use the rather simple Keller jig was informative and should win some adherents. Nick Van followed with his two quite different drawers, one with dovetails made on the Leigh jig and another with finger joints at all corners. Neither used hardware slides. The first used dado slots cut in the cabinet while the second unit operated as a center slider using a centered dado cut. Nick told the story that his raw maple 5/4 boards, bought from Steve Intveld, was "rough stuff," but when he planed and sanded it he uncovered its beautiful flame texture. Nick admits the Leigh jig can be "difficult to set up."


Larry's corner sample was submitted to show how a fantastic finish was possible with the right preparation and use of his favorite finish, ProFin. Larry told his audience that you had to feel the difference, as he

passed the piece to the members. Larry's primary tip was to finish the pieces before they are glued together. Any glue that escapes the joint can easily be wiped clean. Always tape off the glue area before starting the finish operation. Larry uses the Porter Cable jig.



Doop's examples of four differently styled drawers were assembled with self-locking corners stabilized with a pin nailer, by through dovetails with a center slot on the bottom, and by pin nailing only. They were all strong, heavy-duty drawers. Dave Blair showed how he hand-cut his large dovetailed joints into 3/4-inch hardwood to make a strong drawer fitted with outside-mounted slide hardware. Shelly Close exhibited a large, shallow drawer with simple butt joints that had been used successfully for some time.

The evening's half-hour program was highly entertaining but all too brief. The theme deserves a reprise. Doop, or another craftsman, should create a drawer or two that can be put together dry on the spot to clearly show its anatomy and how the various parts are crafted. Such a dry fit assemblage would show the sequence of each step in the construction process and warn of the possible pitfalls that could ensue.

Earlier, Bob showed members some of the new abrasives available from 3M, including a bristle disk that he finds useful when finishing turned projects. He suggested that members take a look at some of their newest products. Another product was a special composite disk available at NAPA stores for about \$6. Both items are gentle but effective, he said. —Jay



It is true that the *raison d'être* is to for equipment manufactures to show their wares to professionals and wood factory related industries which is certainly out of my league but for lovers of fine machinery, it is drool inducing to be able to see a Martin or Altendorf table saw or a CNC router table right in front of you rather than a picture in a magazine.

AWFS is not all large machinery, however, and there are tools of all kinds including thing such as Leigh Jigs, the Wood Rat, hand tools of all kinds, router bits, shaper tooling, sandpaper – you name it: if it has anything to do with woodworking, it will be there.

There is another guilty pleasure that I will admit to, namely, roaming what I call the “wiz bang” area. This is the area that contains booths with everything from super glues that can glue plastic to shellac to clamps that will hold a piece of wood in any position that you could imagine. You can buy the item for a “mere” \$50 but today, at a show price you can purchase this item for only \$19.95...but wait, there’s more – today you can get two of these items for the same price! You just cannot beat such wonderful deals! In all seriousness, however, I can recommend the AFWS as a very fun thing to attend that will take at least a day and maybe more to see everything and there really are good deals to be had.
