Directions to Nick's shop:

Bring and Brag. Ron Grant brought a Segmented Hollow form along with a Sand Blasted Hollow form. Gary Wevers displayed a Scroll Sawn western picture scene. Jim Murphy showed two large salad bowls made from reclaimed urban lumber one from Spalted Maple and the from Popular he also brought in two jewelry boxes made from the same Spalted Maple.

Rick Anderson gave the presentation of the night.

Rick has been self-employed for eleven years now doing woodworking. Rick grew up around wood working his

Grandfather was a Danish craftsman who worked wood well into his eighties. Rick wished he had learned more from his Grandfather, as we all do. He did the typical four years of wood shop in high school then went on to earn his Industrial Design Degree at Western. After he finished schooling he got involved in the boat building industry until the early 1990's when it started to take a turn for the worse. He played in supermarket development for a few years but longed for the smell of saw dust. In 1992 he started working on a focused marketing system. One thing his I.D. education taught him was the importance of designing a product to fit a market need, marketing by design. He started out with a long list of ideas but kept bouncing back to Arbors and Trellises. After researching the market and finding mostly low cost and quality arbors and the occasional very high dollar ones, Rick figured he could make a mid range product with good quality and good price points. He focused on customer direct sales. With this approach he needed to have an easy way to dis-assemble and then a customer re-assemble the product, along with a customer friendly means of shipping, and adaptability to custom sizes and design. Along with premade arbors and trellises Rick offers DIY plans and instructions, he can ship any or all the parts pre-cut for ease of use. Along with the wooden units he subcontracts copper and iron units, which are drop shipped to the customer's house.

Marketing approach: Experience in a vacuum formed plastics business proved that 70% of profits came from the direct to customer sales of 30%. Keeping it simple he offered one price to the homeowner or the trade. Advertising in gardening enthusiast magazines, some direct mailings to the trade, keeping the same look across the years with the same 800 number, and making it easy for people to get a hold of you, has made his business grow. With the advent of the Internet and a little wheeling and dealing Rick got himself a website. With a little blind luck the name of the site (www.gardenarches.com) pops up on the first page of the major search engines. On the website customer can find full color displays of his work along with descriptions and ideas. You must drive people to the website by getting your address out there, on your truck, business cards, ads in magazines, letterheads, and tattooed to your forehead.

Conclusion. Though somewhat seasonal he has been very fortunate to have never been without some backlog. Even though the products are not rocket science Rick stays focused to maintain his competitiveness in the market. It is not an easy way to make a living but when you get up and look forward to going to work it makes all the difference in the world.

All the major manufacturers are represented, and Toolseeker also checks the Internet for an overview of the cost of the tool from more than one source.

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> As if that weren't enough, the site offers a compare-and-contrast feature that allows you to pull up half-a-dozen different tools side-by-side to compare their features. They also have on-line reviews from major magazines (including Popular

Woodworking, naturally), information on sales and rebates and links to other worthy woodworking sites.

All this and they're not trying to sell you anything. In fact, you can't buy anything on the site. They'll provide links to places you can buy the tools, but the banner ads are so subtle that they're never in the way.
