PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Starting is scary. Woodworkers face constraints, constraints of tools and of skills. Wood is also a factor, a big factor. Always buy more wood than you need. You will use it for the inevitable mistake and for achieving a good appearance. Use the best boards for the most visible aspects. Rift sawn stock makes good table legs. Quarter sawn wood has practical advantages for drawers. Grain orientation can be important but nothing beats appearance when gluing up panels. Design first, build second. A save those scraps. This was some of the best advice I ever received.

A sketch is a good place to start. Make a cut list. Plan your work and work your plan. Select wood for each part with care. Rough mill pieces and let them rest. Every time you remove wood, you change the internal tensions of wood. Mill similar dimensions at the same time; work from big to small. Leave pieces oversized until the last possible moment. Measure twice and cut once. Mark your pieces. Glue up with care and don't use too much. Pre-finish pieces if possible. Believe it or not, this is the easier stuff.

Refining the piece before building is harder. Study the dimensions and proportions. Does it look good? Don't be afraid to deviate from plans. Ask for opinions but don't be afraid to ignore what others say. What feels right to you is right.

I sometimes let a special board dictate finished dimensions. The results can be surprising - sometimes good, other times – oh well.

Build and learn; learn and build. Reading will only take you so far. Don't get discouraged. If you blow it, set it aside for another go later. Ask for help! Our club has an enormous amount to talent just for the asking... Take a class. Attend a meeting.

Yes it can be scary but you are amongst friends. Build, build, build and then build some more.

Garrett at the September Meeting

GARRETT HACK VISITS THE NCWA

Our regular September meeting was anything but regular - a special time, day, place and speaker. Woodworking great, Garrett Hack explained how to work efficiently and demonstrated techniques he uses.

Garrett starts with a tree, has it sawn on a woodmizer, and air dries the boards. The building process begins with a sketch. There might be a few mock ups of parts to explore proportions and joinery problems. Then a detailed drawing is rendered. A cut list is produced and patterns are made and refined. Wood for each part is carefully selected.

Machines are used extensively; but, the resulting surfaces are too rough. Only hand tools allow the great precision Garrett strives for. Demonstrating on 2 machine jointed edges, Garrett used a razor sharp hand plane to reduce the high spots until a full width and full length shaving was produced. The hand planed edges mated so well that the two boards could be slid in unison using only slight pressure on the upper board.

Garrett showed that even a well-tuned table saw leaves imperfections. He refines saw cuts with planes to ensure the best fit possible. A marking system is important. Noting grain direction is paramount as is establishing a reference surface. Mark pieces where the marks remain intact. Remark pieces as you continue refining them. Garrett gains efficiency by working methodically, oversizing his pieces and producing extra parts.

To achieve uniqueness, Garrett recommends avoiding standard material thicknesses and using wood's grain carefully and deliberately. Liberate yourself from machine profiles. Try a block plane instead of a router. Garrett softens all edges with block planes. He uses 2; one is set up for coarse work and the other for fine. Not having to readjust tools and less frequent sharpening improves efficiency.

Hand tools can reduce or eliminate sanding. They are quick and quiet too. While nothing beats a hand planed surface, tear out can happen. Scraping will smooth even difficult woods. however, the surface won't be as good as a planed surface as Garrett demonstrated.

Don't underestimate the huge impact of small details. Beads and inlay produced with a simple shop made scratch stock can elevate your work. Using a scratch stock, Garrett cut a channel and inlayed a thin piece of contrasting wood which even folks in the back of the room could see.

Our visit with Garrett passed too quickly. After concluding the formal presentation, Garrett entertained questions and invited people to come up afterwards. And come they did, a throng surged forward. Garrett's presentation was a treat. He fluidly demonstrated how hand tools compliment machines and allow him to efficiently craft finely made and impeccably detailed furniture of the highest standard.
