MARQUETRY IS WOODWORKING WITH THIN WOOD VENEERS

Jennifer Dolese gave us a very interesting and detailed look at marquetry, a design technique in which an array of wood veneers is used to create a picture. Like a puzzle, each piece is cut and fitted together to form a single sheet. The sheet is then glued to a substrate to form a solid panel that can be framed and used as wall decor or worked into a furniture project.

Jennifer began her adventure in marquetry eighteen years ago by attending a week-long class. Marquetry demands an artistic eye perhaps more so than general woodworking. Jennifer chooses wood veneers for their grain patterns and color and keeps a good stock of thin veneers on hand. The work requires design materials and a good quality scroll saw. To ensure a tight fit, the machine table is tipped to about 30 degrees to cut beveled pairs of veneers, one part fills the created opening into which the other part is glued in place.

Jennifer and her husband, Tom, own Terra Firma Design in Bellingham and have been utilizing her work with his woodworking creations to market decor and furniture pieces. A featured lamp, or lantern, they produce together is an attractive wood structure that displays a four-sided decoration of Jennifer's translucent wood veneer panels that make a striking visual when lighted. This delighted the audience.


OCTOBER BRING AND BRAG

Jay Geisel displayed an unusual 12x36 black pine table overlaid with a draped scarf which was (surprise) wood backed. Scarf looked soft, but was finished in place with decoupage medium plus acrylic topcoats. (Above)

Dan Cain proudly displayed a laminated stool project he made 50 years ago. The teacher had a good amount of veneer and the class **learned** how to bend and glue the plies together. (Left Top)

Jerry Couchman showed off a Teak Deck Table he built for his wife. Looked like a lot of math was required to get the pie-shaped sections to come out right! (Not Pictured)

Michael Titus showed us a three-legged footstool of red oak he treated with Daly's Ben-Matte. He took care of a bad check in the wood with a contrasting butterfly dovetail. (Left Middle)

Gordy Dahl displayed two Norwegian bentwood boxes of alder and finished with Danish oil. He experimented with boiling walnut to bend it and finally created his own steam box for wood bending. Top is held on by a carved wooden pin. (Left Bottom)

Dick Carey says he band-sawed a chunk of spalted birch open to see what was inside and *voila!* a nice looking box. (Right Bottom)

Andrew Pellar *finally* got around to making slide-in inserts (dovetailed) for his MDF table saw throat plate. These can be interchanged to permit thin-kerf or dado work, etc.

NEW CLASS OFFERING

Prairie Settee

Are you looking for an ambitious and somewhat advanced project? Bill Eppler, an NCWA member who lives in Anacortes, has asked Tom Dolese to teach a class to build a Prairie Settee. There are three more student spots open. The class will be held in late January or early February, and will last two weeks, Monday through Thursday (and Fridays, if necessary).

Each student will build a settee, with length of the piece determined by each builder. The case will be made using mortise & tenon joinery; a vacuum press will be used to veneer the panels, which will be fitted into the frames. Arms and corbels will be joined to the case, which will then be prepared for upholstery. Hand and power tools will be used.

Tuition for the class is \$1,000 + cost of materials. Tom can supply the wood and veneer if he's given enough advance notice. Tom has a couple of settees/settles in his house, if anyone would like to see and sit in them. Please contact Tom Dolese at dolesejt@msncom. His shop is located at 2139 Humboldt St., Bellingham. OCTOBER BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 9, 2013

The NCWA Board of Directors held its October meeting at the Farmhouse Restaurant on Route 20, Mount Vernon, Wednesday evening, October 9, 2013, at 7 p.m. President Andrew Pellar distributed a full agenda that resulted in the Board's approval of five proposals.

Program chair Jerry Couchman reviewed the meeting line-up for the rest of the year as follows: November see a woodcarving demonstration by Coupeville artist Dick Weber who teaches in the immediate area. The November business meeting will be devoted to the delivery of our toys to representatives of the local US Marine Corps Reserve's annual Toy for Tots Christmas distribution. That ceremony will precede the evening's woodcarving program. The December meeting will feature our first family Christmas party to be held at the Hillcrest Lodge on December 3rd, our regular meeting date. Couchman distributed a list of 25 possibilities for 2014 Club programs, which generated talk and yet other possible programs and field trips.

Jerry Anderson discussed our policy of withholding educational classes from unsigned members and a method to check a member's renewal status before registering for a class.

Treasurer Doug Duhening reported a treasury balance of \$6,113 and a present membership total of 149. Doug proposed selling the Club's initial video projector to his church. This is one that has been supplanted with a projector of better quality. A discussion of price and whether there's a need for redundancy followed. The redundancy question will be left up to a decision by A-V chairman Charley Drake, who was not present. The Board approved the conditional sale at a price of \$150.

Webmeister Mike Titus described an e-mail problem and offered a solution: Mail Chimp. The Board approved the system. (See Mike's story on another page.)

Fall season shop visits occur this month. The tour of five member shops in Shelter Bay begins at 9 a.m. Saturday, October 19, according to chairman Gary Danilson. Tours are expected to be over about 1 p.m. A luncheon will follow. The plan is to start with Jerry Anderson and then spread out to the other workshops in Shelter Bay: Bill Thesius, Tom Napier, Jim Barrett, Jay Geisel, and Jim Hyatt.

Danilson outlined plans for the December Christmas party. Food service, awards, a silent auction, and other features were proposed. The family party takes place on Tuesday, December 3rd, at Hillcrest Lodge. The Board approved a budget request.

The 2014 nominating committee tendered a slate of candidates for the up-coming elections. Jerry Anderson and Jerry Couchman selected Don Wilkins for Vice President, Doug Duhening, Treasurer, and Tim Wynn, Secretary. Board members voted their approval.

Pellar spoke about discounts being offered to members on woodworking magazine subscriptions. He suggested that the subscriptions might also be used as prizes to award our Club members.

Board Members present: Anderson, Al Ashley, Bill Baer, John Belanger, Couchman, Phil Choquette, Danilson, Duhening, Jay Geisel, Pellar, Ed Pysner, and Mike Titus.
