-The meeting was convened by President George Knutson on 4/2/2019, 7pm at the Mt Vernon Christian School.

-The club library is looking at adding new books/dvds. Any suggestions for additions can be made thru the club suggestion box.

-Our Spring Shop Tour had over 50 members attend and was considered a great success.

-Shows Chairman David Vandette gave an update on the upcoming Apr 27-28 Woodfest. Help is still needed manning the Toys 4 Tots booth and as greeters. David mentioned what a great support Woodfest is to student woodworkers.

-Education Chairman Greg Koenker went over classes that still had openings since they weren't published in this month's newsletter. Greg stressed the importance of filling out the standby slots even if classes were full. He reminded everyone that our classes run from Sept-May.

-Member David Helm asked that anyone interested in working for the 2020 Census to get in touch with him. Part or full-time work at \$18.50 to \$20.50/hour.

April 10, 2018

- The meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. by President George Knutson at the Farmhouse Restaurant in Mt. Vernon.
- Members present: Sascha Vandette, David Vandette, Bill Rawls, John Braun, George Knutson, Tim Wynn, Al Ashley, Phil Humphries, Greg Koenker, Jim Bucknell
- Treasurer's Report:
 - NCWA has a total of \$9,194.49 in checking and savings accounts as of 04/10/2019.
 - Total membership of NCWA is 207 as of 04/10/2019.
 - o 4 new members for 2019 to date
 - Board reviewed the cash basis financial report (budget to actual) for the quarter ended March 31, 2019. No budget adjustments were made.
- Shows Committee. (David Vandette)
 - Woodfest dates are Saturday, April 27th, 9-4 and Sunday, April 28th, 10-3.
 - NCWA Woodfest support is ready. All demos, Toys for Tots help, greeters are ready.
 - Sascha Vandette suggested that it might be appropriate to charge NCWA members who sell items at shows a modest fee for letting them use the NCWA venue. This suggestion initiated an extended discussion with numerous comments both for and against the suggestion. Finally, Jim Bucknell moved and Phil Humphries seconded a motion that:
 - NCWA members who sell at NCWA show venues will be assessed a 20% selling fee if they do
 not participate in the show venue (as a demonstrator, or greeter, or booth manager, etc.) and
 a 10% fee if they do participate. The motion was passed.
- George Knutson then led a discussion on the General Meeting 'Ask the Experts' period. While most board members thought it had some merit there was a consensus that individual questions should not be addressed in the open meeting as most questions were very specific and were not, in general, of interest to the entire membership. Instead Board members wanted to promote and encourage the use of the forum on the NCWA website.

"I was just wondering....."

George Knutson May 2019

I spent most of the past weekend at the NCWA booth at Woodfest and had a GREAT time! Lots of conversations with lots of people about all things wood related. If you've never attended, or assisted in our booth, you really should plan on it for next year. But the best part for me was the kids. Young kids, older kids. Small kids, bigger kids. Girls and boys alike. They were smiling and laughing as they teamed up and built a Builder Board house, only to dismantle it and start another one all over again. Bigger and better!! And the kids who made cars and trucks at our Toys For Tots table were SO fun to watch. Most were pretty serious when they started out, but quickly figured out that "Hey, this isn't so tough". They clearly left with a newfound sense of accomplishment and satisfaction. And then there were the projects on display by the "kids" at 8 area high schools. Some pretty impressive pieces!!

So here's what "I was just wondering":

Do you remember some of your first woodworking projects? Mine were pretty crude. But I built them, and was very proud of them. And they got better, thank God!! My Dad had a box of wood scraps under a small bench built of 2 x 12's in the basement. Hand tools were hanging on nails on the wall, just barely within reach for me. I built boxes for my "treasures". And ladders for tree forts. And go karts with no engines on them, remember them? You needed a friend to push you, or a hill. In western Minnesota, we had very few, very small hills!! My feet on the ground were my brakes on the first models. Then I took Wood Shop in 7th grade and built a small wall hanging shelf which hangs in my shop today. Again, nothing fancy, but it built self confidence in a kid who was lacking it in a big way at the time.

We all have kids in our lives, whether they're our own kids, or grandkids, or nieces, or nephews, or neighbor kids, or friends with kids.

So next time you're out in your shop, looking for something to work on, put together some materials for a small project that a kid could do. Something simple. Something like one of YOUR first projects. And when those "kids" in your life come around next time, take them out to your shop and plant that seed for another woodworker. And water it often. One success leads to another and another. Too many kids these days use only their thumbs (as in video games). Get them using all 10 of their digits and I bet they'll be amazed what they can do!!! And they'll keep coming back for more.
