NCWA General Membership Meeting – Via ZOOM February 2, 2021

The meeting was called to order by King Dahl at 7:05 PM.

First order of business was introduction and welcome of Guests and New Members.

Donald Erickson and Allen McCall introduced themselves and Deb Manion introduced Kurt, a guest for the meeting.

Phil Humphries then introduced Dale Brotherton, owner/operator of Takumi Japanese Woodworking, a firm located in the Seattle area. His website is https://japanesecarpentry.com/

Dale started his presentation with a short history of Japanese architecture, and then proceeded to show a variety of Japanese woodworking tools. He demonstrated cutting a dovetail joint typically used in Japanese post and beam construction.

While completing the demonstration Dale entertained questions, as well as a Q & A session afterwards. Dale teaches a class at the Port Townsend School of Woodworking in April.

Greg Koenker announced a VST for Monday, Feb 8, 2021. Topic is shop-made Jigs and Microjigs and uses for the MicroJig system.

Jerry Couchman displayed a bed frame with two floating nightstands. The headboard of laminated maple and walnut was carved on a CNC machine to produce a stunning rendering of Mt. Baker. Jerry also displayed two chests he had built as Christmas gifts for family.

Phil Humphries showed a green wood spatula using natural curves in the raw wood to result in a strong and well shaped utensil.


Bob Pavia had completed a bench to use in his home entryway.

Stan Creighton displayed an intricate cutting board with an almost 3D image as a result of the glue up pattern of the block. Stan also had a maple and wenge coffee table.

Nick Pederson had built a trestle table from a live edge slab of Elm that he ripped and joined the live edges in the middle using bowties.

Phil Kezele showed how he had built windows on pivot hinges to connect two rooms in his home, closely matching the detail of the exterior windows and bringing added light indoors.

Bill Pierce showed a dovetail box built using only hand tools.

Gary Danilson displayed two carved hair pins and a band sawn box with flocked drawers.

John Erbstoeszer had built an Adirondack style chair using skis for the back and arms.

Greg Robinson had an extension to his workbench with holes for a down draft dust collection system. He also had a set of cabinets to surround a Murphy Bed that has some interesting curved elements produced on his CNC system.

Jim Ferguson displayed a humidor made of curly maple and a walnut band sawn box featuring zebrawood handles on the drawers.

Finally, **Jim Bucknell** showed the prototype student desk built from pre-finished ¾" plywood. This project is planned to produce approximately 60 desks to be distributed for use by grade school students in need a dedicated desk for home schooling required due to Covid-19. How to Access ZOOM for March 2nd Meeting

Thanks to those of you who have been attending the Zoom Meetings . The feedback has been excellent, and building on that momentum, we look forward to another wonderful virtual presentation this month.

The March meeting will follow regular schedule with a business meeting, Bring & Brag, and presentation.

NCWA members are welcomed to login to Zoom beginning at 6:30 PM to allow some time for those wanting or needing to get familiar with the Zoom format before the meeting begins at 7:00 PM.

The invitation to join details were/will be sent to you in a separate email

As a refresher...a couple of things to be aware of for Zoom meetings...

At 6:30 PM the Zoom host (King Dahl) will mute everyone's microphones. This will eliminate background noise that can come over your mic inadvertently, even if you are not speaking.

There are two buttons at the bottom of your screen - the Participants Button and the Chat Button. Depending on whether you are using a Mac, PC, iPad, iPhone, or other device, the buttons may be in slightly different locations.

Clicking the Participants Button allows you to view a list of all NCWA members that have joined the Zoom meeting. It also allows you to click a button to "Raise your hand" if you'd like to be unmuted to speak or ask a question. Using this "Raise your hand" feature helps avoid confusion and the potential of people talking over each other.

The Chat Button allows you to chat/text to a specific person during the meeting, privately, or you can send a message to everyone in attendance. Anytime during the presentation, if you have a question for the presenter, **Chat it to NCWA Wood** (that goes to the host, King Dahl) and he will forward it to the presenter at the appropriate time. We will do our best to get as many questions answered as possible.

Lastly, if for any reason, your internet drops you from the meeting, re-click the invitation link to re-join. Everyone's internet service is a bit different, with some better than others, so we hope your service will allow a pleasant viewing and participatory experience for you.

Great Members - Great Woodworking Talent A Great Vendor – A Community in Need...

Put them all in a blender and what do you get? Great Results!... and lots and lots of school desks. 72 DESKS, to be precise!

This past Thursday, February 25, several NCWA members delivered 47 hand-built school desks to the Burlington-Edison School District, and 25 desks to the Villa Santa Maria apartment complex (serving the Kulshan Creek Neighborhood Youth Program) so that they could distribute them to students in need who attend virtual school from home, necessitated by the pandemic. Many families found themselves in a predicament these past months without an adequate study spot at home for their school-age children. And these desks will provide a nice, focused spot for schoolwork, so the students can continue to thrive, even while they attend Zoom school from home.

The seeds of this project were planted when Immediate-Past-President, Jim Bucknell, approached the NCWA Board of Directors to see if they were interested in pursuing this project if the demand was as great as he suspected. The board was very enthusiastic about the project so Jim contacted a local school district, which was beyond excited about the prospects. School-age kids from the Kulshan Creek Neighborhood Youth Program were added, as well. The board approved the purchase of a sheet of 3/4" pre-finished maple plywood and other supplies, and Jim built two prototypes for the district to select their preferred version.

The plywood from came from Windsor Plywood in Bellingham, one of NCWA's preferred vendors. The price per sheet was about \$75. Being a shrewd negotiator, Jim asked Windsor if it was possible to get a larger discount if we purchased 30 sheets (enough for over 70 desks). Windsor's manager, Ken Asp, liked the idea behind the project so much that he went to his supplier and, ultimately, the manufacturer. They agreed to provide 30 sheets of the high-quality plywood **FREE OF CHARGE!** This constituted a donation of nearly \$2,300 from Windsor!

Once the decision was made to proceed, we put out the call for volunteers to build the desks. Our club, being filled with warm hearts and kind souls, gave a very positive response. Jim got to work preparing plans, a parts list, and a cut list to distribute to all volunteers.





Several members picked up full sheets of plywood directly from Windsor Plywood, and began making sawdust. And arrangements were made to deliver the remaining sheets to George Knutson's shop where he, Greg Koenker, and King Dahl broke the sheets down into more manageable sizes for transport.

Club volunteers spanned the spectrum from new members to seasoned veterans, each building desks their own way, while maintaining a uniform final product. Once finished and delivered, the desks were labeled with a sticker indicating they were built by the NCWA and materials were donated by Windsor Plywood in Bellingham.

This was such a wonderful project for NCWA, and our members really stepped up to fill the need in our community. We want to give a special, heart-felt thank you to all of the generous volunteers who helped make learning for many of our local school children a bit easier during this difficult time. We salute you, and the community salutes you.

President's Message

I don't know about you, but I was intrigued by Dale Brotherton's excellent presentation and demonstration of his Japanese Woodworking techniques during the February meeting.

Watching him create such a beautiful dovetail joint in front of our eyes - with just a couple of chisels, handsaws, and planes, and not a single clamp but not for his knee - conjured up two adages I heard frequently as I grew up.

Mind you, my mother was the youngest of 8 siblings. This afforded me a treasure trove of uncles, many woodworkers to varying degrees, all men that worked with their hands (generationally and geographically, back then my aunts tended to be traditional, midwestern homemakers, so they left the building, fixing, and "guy" stuff to my uncles to mentor the next generation).

As such, there was never a shortage of folksy maxims frequently bestowed upon my young, impressionable ears. The ones that came rushing back to memory during Dale's presentation were...

"It's a poor craftsman that blames his tools", and "A job worth doing, is a job worth doing right".

Watching Dale made me reconsider my own "bull in a china shop" approach as I pondered my work style in my shop - loud machines whirring, sawdust spewing, my own cursing heard above all else as my frustration grows in figuring out how to cover up another mistake likely caused by taking an ill-advised shortcut. You get the picture.

But Dale showed that through refined techniques, discipline, and slowing down, beauty emerges. And treating wood like a partner in the project, instead of a material that needs to be conquered, offers harmony in design and care in construction.

While still not quite limber enough to eliminate the use of clamps, I'm certainly motivated to work on my technique and eliminate blaming my tools, and to embrace all my projects as worth doing, which means continuing to strive to do them right.

In closing, I offer one last quote from my wise uncles from the days of yore. This one sums up the importance of hard work and discipline as we all work at improving our woodworking craft...

"If you wanna dance, you've gotta pay the piper".
