NCWA-Chat

A Bit of a Ramble About the NCWA-Chat Mailing List

Hey folks! I wanted to bend your ear for a couple minutes if I could about the NCWA-Chat mailing list. Chances are you've probably heard about it in the past few months; the board set it up as a way to stay in touch with your fellow NCWA members on the 28-ish other days of the month when we're not Zooming it up for the club meeting! We've been slowly growing since this past April, and just about a third of NCWA members have signed up, which is pretty amazing for the online component of a community!

As someone who's been tromping around various parts of the internet since 1993, I'd have to say we already have a pretty great community here, and I'm really pleased with all the positive communication, help, advice, news, and even sales that have been facilitated in the mere five months that the mailing list has been active! We've got over 150 conversations that have happened, some with upwards of 50 replies. That's not to say that it's a crazy active list -- there are peaks and lulls, just as with any community, but the ease of use and the high level of engagement from both experts and newcomers alike has been super encouraging! For a novice like me, I feel like I'm getting almost an unfair advantage to the amount of information I'm absorbing, especially when I can ask just about anything!

In fact, here are some highlights from the list:

- A question about setting up a new Sawstop ended in three people meeting up to work on it together.
- Multiple discussions about lumber sources for various projects, including who to contact if you need someone with a mobile mill.
- Many, many tool sales.
- Discussions about vintage tools, and their care and feeding.
- A few discussions about dust collection setups and how best to approach it.
- Someone gave away a nice burl, and that turned into a couple of folks getting together to learn more about turning.
- We started a topic called "Workshop Wednesday" where once a week, folks share whatever in-progress thing they're working on. Just to share, or even to get advice on how to progress! There've been some amazing projects that we've gotten to see as they come along.
- A discussion about other hobbies and pursuits gave lots of folks an opportunity to see other areas where their interests overlap. (Man, there's a lot of you boat people out there!)
- A call for help (okay, it was me) in transporting a craigslist purchase turned into two other folks showing up and helping evaluate the tool's quality before finalizing the sale.

In the beginning, we started with just board members and myself, to see if the idea would work. To kick the tires, if you will. We tested the ease of signing up, of changing preferences, posting images, asking questions and getting answers, and even selling stuff! It worked very well, and that's when we opened it up to the group at large. We started slow, but have been building membership steadily in the past few months. In fact, if the latest member roster is correct, then there's a rough 31.9% chance that you belong to the list already! That's right, we've got 68 out of approximately 213 NCWA members active on the mailing list, and that's pretty great.

There's been a concerted effort by the more experienced members of the club to offer advice, and everyone's more or less been pitching in in some fashion or another. I've been bowled over at the kindness and generosity of the folks in this club, and the outpouring of helpfulness on the mailing list has reflected that general attitude 100%. It's also been a great place for the experts to share higher-level tips and strategies with each other, and I don't think I'd be wrong to say that everyone involved has gotten a fair bit out of signing up.

If this sounds interesting to you, and if you wish you could talk shop with folks more than once or twice a month, I would strongly encourage you to come join the conversation!

Single cutaway style guitar -

- Sapele body with a curly maple top
- Curly maple and walnut neck with zircote fretboard and curly maple binding
- Fret markers are aluminum tubing with curly maple inlay
- Side markers are also aluminum tubing with black inlay
- Knobs are maple body with zircote tops inlaid with aluminum tubing and black center inlay

Many people on the NCWA Chat have helped with finish and slab work ideas. The slab finish is Jerry Couchman's recipe and I used the Nyalox wheels Mark Kraus recommended to prep the live edge, they worked great.

I still have to match the new superstructure pieces with the recommendations from George K., Nick Pederson, Andrew Pellar, and Richard Gillingham. I am going to contact Michael Dresdner, because I want to apply what he presented in his lecture. I think I will get to the next level if I can stretch my color experience by glazing or stain matching.

Finally, my patio table made of Cumaru is done. The top has breadboard ends. The aprons and legs are put together using castle joints. I finished it with boiled linseed oil mixed with a little bit of Japan Drier. The wood is Cumaru.

First is a stand made of koa. It is 38" tall. It is the most 'James Krenovian' style of woodworking that I have designed/built. On top of the stand I placed a walnut/rosewood inclined book stand that I made years ago (1988). I use this stand for referencing large format books that I use (mostly medical textbooks and references). I find it more convenient to have a walk up stand to read from while standing to be easier for these large books.







The second is a simple stool that is 18" tall. The seat is a small slab of parota (also called guanacaste). Nice grain structure, but the interlocking grain made surfacing a little more challenging in a few areas. The legs are black walnut. Just needed a stool for the house, so I made this from available scraps in the shop this past week.

This is the first thing I've made with lumber that I dimensioned myself! It's made out of reclaimed cedar to hold my cold-brew coffee setup. The big black container is where the coffee brews, and it's got four little legs that let it stand over the jug to drain. I've been close to tipping it over and spilling it for years, so I finally did something about it!

I made the supports under the mitered top before I created my jointing jig, so they're not really square, but I decided that "perfect is the enemy of done", and got on with it. That and I didn't want to waste good cedar!

James Krenov: Leave Fingerprints, by Brendan Gaffney (2020)

Mark Kraus – "I am now reading the biography of James Krenov, *James Krenov: Leave Fingerprints*, by Brenden Gaffney (2020). Like most of you, I am well familiar with his work, read articles about him and read his various books, and even seen a few pieces that he has made. So I was unsure how insightful his biography might be. I don't want to give away any of his story, but his early life prior to College of the Redwoods was much more colorful, eventful and fascinating than I realized. And it added a lot of insight into how he developed professionally and philosophically about wood working. If you enjoy biographies, you may want to pick up a copy.

A curious aside: If you look closely at the book cover for A Cabinetmaker's Notebook, you will see a mistake in his layout for the dovetails. Despite his incredible mastery of woodworking, he too was just a mere mortal. It gives me hope."

Note: Author Brendan Gaffney has previously presented to the NCWA on green furniture building, as well as a presentation on this book.

The Fine Art of Marquetry, by Craig Vandall Stevens

Bill Epler – "This a great book to introduce you to marquetry. The book begins by covering the equipment needed to begin making your own pieces and types of veneer that can be used. There are instructions on using a fret saw to get you into marquetry without having to buy an expensive scroll saw.

Practice designs are included, beginning with the very simple and continuing with more complex designs. Stevens leads you through each design step by step so you develop a good understanding of the details involved to create a marquetry piece.

Jennifer Dolese used this book in the class she taught for NCWA members and it was perfect for the class. I checked out the book to get a refresher on the processes so I can start working on some marquetry pieces again."

Note: Jennifer Dolese is a member of NCWA and teaches a class on marquetry.
