### **David Fisher - Greenwood Carving: Finding Flow**







<u>David Fisher</u> is fascinated with the flow of the line, the sensation of texture, and the play of light and shadow. His designs are guided by those elements, as well as the unique nature of each piece of tree.

Green woodworking can imply more than just the general notion of working with wood that is relatively fresh with a high moisture content. The term connotes the idea of working with nature, sensitively considering the unique attributes of each bit of tree, including them flow of the fibers. The carver adapts to what nature has provided. This can be a serendipitous journey between the hands and material as the destination is gradually revealed.

Dave will present examples of his work and working methods. And he'll explain his approach to design and how we can take inspiration from nature to imbue our pieces with a sense of movement and life. He will encourage the same sense of playfulness he had as a boy looking for sticks.


Pretty simple, eh? If you get an overdue notice (sent if you've still got the item after 2 mos.), simply correspond with Richard and arrange to return the item.

# In the Greene & Greene Style Projects and Details for the Woodworker By Darrell Peart NCWA Library # 58-536

Bob Pavia – "The Greene brothers were at the forefront of the California Arts and Crafts movement in the early 1900s, designing complete estates along with their interior furnishings. The furniture designs were brought to life in the woodworking shop of Peter and John Hall. Their designs have been popular among woodworkers ever since.



One of the best modern practitioners of Greene and Greene design is this book's author Darrell Peart (<a href="https://furnituremaker.com">https://furnituremaker.com</a>) who presented to our club in July 2021. In our own club, George Knutson is well known for his Greene and Greene furniture. He presented to the club in September 2021. <a href="https://click.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/click.ncbi.n

This book is an excellent resource if you have been inspired by Peart or Knutson to start your own project. The Greene and Greene style has several iconic design elements: Arched pulls, rectangular plugs, ebony splines, and waterfall legs to name a few. The first seven book chapters provide step-by-step methods in paragraph style with tool setups for building these design elements.

The final two chapters are plans for completing two Peart designs in the Greene and Greene style: Speaker Stands and a Wall Mirror. Both projects provide an opportunity to try out Greene and Greene design elements showcased in the first part of the book. Peart gives excellent and very detailed descriptions (including his own "secrets to success") for both projects. The wall mirror is the more compelling of the two designs.


Peart's book is worthwhile reading for those starting to build a classic Greene & Greene piece or those wishing to incorporate one or more of Greene's design elements into their own work. This is a hands-on oriented book with dimensioned drawings and high quality color photographs. There are examples suitable for beginning woodworkers, but most are more approachable for those with intermediate and advanced skills.

#### The Woodfinishing Book by Michael Dresdner

1st edition, The Taunton Press © 1992 213 pages (companion video is also available)

Mark Krauss – I may be dating myself to writeup a review of a book that is nearly 30 years old. There is a newer  $2^{nd}$  revised edition 'The New Wood Finishing Book' © 1999, which I do not have. But it is a very good book that introduces and explains the world of wood finishes. The chapters start with finish choice, and then walk through the various processes from wood preparation to rubbing out the finish and repairs.



I find the focus of this book to be more on 'how to', with good explanations of the author's techniques. In many cases it offers quite detailed instructions, such as how to wipe a stain or rub a finish. Not only does it explain the mechanical steps of what to do, but also explains why, often with diagrams that help explain things.

One especially useful part of the book is a large pull out chart that categorically details the characteristics of the myriad of finishes available. If you have ever stood in the aisleway of your favorite woodworking store (or on their website) and wondered where do I start, this chart can help. Since its publication, there have been some advances in the finishes available, so it may not be the last word. But it should help you narrow your selection based upon your criteria for that finishing job.

As all of us have experienced at one time or another, things don't always go according to plan. The author includes several amusing vignettes about adventures and misadventures from his own wood finishing career.

Note: Michael Dresdner has previously presented his wood finishing techniques to NCWA both in a monthly meeting, and in a 3-Hour Intensive On-line Workshop.

Be sure to check the November newsletter, as it will feature more reviews on wood finishing books that Mark Krauss has recently read and reviewed.

### **Exploring Wood Carving**

Date: October 9, 2021

**Time:** 9:00am - 12:00pm

Class Size: 2-4

**Instructor:** Bill Pierce

**Location:** Jim Corbin's shop 5792 Inez Street, Bow, WA 98232 (directions below)

This class will help you explore your interest in wood carving. It's a hands-on class where you will create your own chip carving in one of a few selected styles without a significant investment in carving tools.

Along the way, you'll learn some basic principles of good carving to help get you started. In creating your carving, you will learn to transfer a pattern and why sharp tools are important. We will discuss grain and how to carve with it. Then you will learn to set-in and carve out your pattern and finish it with wax.

THINGS TO BRING: Students should bring a sharp, thin, pointed knife (preferably a chip carving knife or a skew-chisel) they wish to carve with and a board 6" wide, 6" long and at least 3/8" thick with knot-free, straight grain running along one of the 6" dimensions. Easily carved woods like basswood, alaskan yellow cedar, sugar pine, poplar, or alder are suggested. Tools and basswood (in memory of Jim Gleeson) will be provided for students who don't have them.

1. Treasurer's Report (Al Ashley). Al provided copies of the monthly report and a preliminary copy of the 2022 budget via email to all members of the Board.

The budget was discussed at length, particularly the impact of Covid-19 on many areas of the budget. The 2022 budget will remain an open item at this point. Al Ashley made a motion do keep the annual dues \$35.00 for 2022. This motion was seconded and passed by show of hands.

Sascha Vandette raised a question regarding the minutes of General Membership Meetings and Board Meetings. At some point in the past all Board members were provided a draft copy of the minutes prior to them being published in the newsletter. She would like to have us resume that practice. Beginning this month the minutes will be sent (email) to members of the Board for review prior to being published. (see cover letter).

- 5. Donation from Charley's friend, Lin Folsom. King provided Charkey with flowers and a thank you card to Lin for her generous donation to the NCWA. Phil Humphries suggested that the money be used for a scholarship or endowment. Discussion brought up several questions about how something like this could be set up. - 6. Intensive workshops. George Knutson is working with a presenter for another workshop similar to the Michael Dresdner workshop. George was not available to update this topic.
