Moving on, I'd like to announce this year's President's Challenge. For those new to the club, each year the current club President comes up with a woodworking challenge, or theme. The only stipulation is that your project, has to include something you have never tried working with before.

You should have plenty of time to come up with an idea and work on it, as the plan will be to show your creations in July's Bring and Brag!

Bring & Brag

A few days prior to the monthly meeting, submit 3-4 photos of your project, along with pertinent information like wood species, type of finish, or any other notes of interest to Greg Koenker at gkoenker@gmail.com

Submitted by Steve Lloyd – Wall sculpture made entirely from Alaska driftwood, which is my material of choice. It's about 5 feet by 5 feet, and extends 4 feet away from the wall at its highest point. The primary wood species are Sitka alder (alnus sinuata) and Western hemlock, with a few other species thrown in. The spalting in shades of red, green and silver is due to the saltwater saturation in the wood, which I dry for a minimum of one year before using. The joinery is 1/4-inch routered dadoes joined with mahogany splines, glued with Gorilla Wood Glue and hand-sanded to 320 grit, then four-ought steel wool, then two coats of hand-rubbed beeswax & turpentine. I have approximately 150 hours in this piece, which has been submitted to this year's juried Anacortes Arts Festival.

Minutes of Board of Directors Meeting (Zoom)

April 14, 2022

Meeting call to order at 7:00 PM. Members present included: Greg Koenker, Al Ashley, John Ellis, George Lanphear, George Knutson, Jerry Couchman, Nick Pederson, Jim Ferguson, John Braun, Sascha and David Vandette, Tony Etienne, Bill Pierce.

1. Treasurer's Report (Al Ashley). Al had sent email copies of the monthly report and quarterly report for first quarter 2022 to all members of the board.

Total membership stands at 206, the same as 2021 for April.

- 2. Membership Committee (Jerry Couchman.) New members 2022 YTD 8. One pending new member.
- 3. Programs Committee (Jim Ferguson.) Jim provided names of scheduled presenters along with people he's been in contact with regarding future presentations. This led into discussion about how we will handle presentations when we resume in person meetings. This was discussed later in the meeting.
- 4. Library Committee (Bill Pierce.) A question was raised regarding handling of E books and other electronic media. Several suggestions were made including use of a third party library vendor or service to deal with items that would only be available for a certain period of time with a built in expiration date. This should be a continuing item over the next few months as people research how we can address this.
- 5. Education Committee (Sascha Vandette.) Looking at resuming in person classes. Several instructors have indicated they are willing to resume classes with some restrictions. A schedule of possible classes should be published soon.
- 6. Shows Committee. David and Sascha brought us up to date on status of Woodfest.
- 7. Resumption of in person membership meetings. A lot of this discussion was centered on our ability to conduct meetings in person along with Zoom, for the members who are not comfortable with live gatherings. A motion was made and passed by show of hands to form a committee to interface with the Christian School and determine how we can achieve this goal. The general agreement is to shoot for live meetings by September or October of this year. Part of this discussion also addressed having the picnic in August or September, at which time the board would be able to get more direct feedback from the general membership about in person meetings.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 8:40 PM.



NCWA Resources

Click this link – <u>NCWA Resources</u> – for our user-friendly database serving the purpose of storing information about recommendations from NCWA members.

There are 5 tables (1 tab for each) across the top, you can click each one to see its contents. This page is evolving and being updated in real time, so there will be new additions frequently.



- **Commercial Resources:** list of companies (incl website and phone #) and what people recommend them for
- **Educational Resources:** online resources for different topics, grouped by topic (this doesn't have to be limited to videos, we can have books and other stuff too)
- **Members Recommend:** This table is automatically generated by the first two, and keeps track of who's recommending what
- **Recommendation Topics:** This is another automatic table, and lists commercial resources (the first table) grouped by topic
- **Locations:** a final automatic table that lists which commercial resources (again, the first table) are located in which cities, so that it's easier to see what's near you
