
A Message from the President...

Garrett Hack is an internationally known furniture maker, educator, writer, and farmer from Thetford, Vermont. A furniture maker for almost 50 years, he has created his own style with designs that continually push his skills to the next level. He's also an in-demand woodworking instructor, teaching classes in Germany, England, Austria, Italy, Spain, Canada, Australia, Israel, Japan, and the US.


Garrett has a great love of hand tools and uses them in everything he builds, from shaping curves to delicate details. He is the author of The Handplane Book (Taunton Press, 1997) and Classic Hand Tools (Taunton Press, 1999), a contributing editor at Fine Woodworking magazine (30 years), and former chairman of the Furniture Masters.

His presentation is titled DEVELOPING A DESIGN.

How do you get started planning out and designing a new project? To illustrate his process, Garrett will show images of some of his furniture as well as use two projects now in his shop. He will discuss choosing appropriate materials and how to use them optimally, planning out a logical construction strategy, deciding what techniques might efficiently and accurately get you to your goal, and which details could enhance and enliven the work.

His previous presentations to the club have been widely praised. In fact, if you recall, Garrett was our first presenter to do a session via Zoom in 2020, when we decided to conduct our monthly meetings virtually, due to Covid.

This is a presentation you will not want to miss.

Submitted by George Lanphear – From start to finish I've been working on this for over a year. Lots of that time was spent drawing and trying ideas. I actually have an idea to make the body (knot) that would be solid wood and not the plywood and blocks covered with veneer. Final product is cherry, cherry veneer and the accent pieces are hickory.

I've had "Hickory, Dickery, Dock" running through my brain for about 10 months, ever since I came across some hickory at Martin Lumber while looking for cherry and something contrasting to make the trim.

Stained the cherry with Mixwax gel stain. In the lighting when I took the picture, some of the panels of the base appear darker, but they were cut from pieces of continuous grain. Cherry veneer plywood finished with 5 coats Minwax water based wipe on polyurethane.





Submitted by Dennis O-Hern – My latest project... I call it a firewood fish. I bought a load of firewood


a few years back that had some nice figured maple in it. Much too pretty to burn! The base is a piece of driftwood coated in polyurethane. The fish is finished in lacquer.





Submitted by Mark Kraus – They say you should wait a while to allow the wood to reach equilibrium before cutting it to the finished size. This table top is about 200 million years old – and pretty stabilized by now (and rock hard). I purchased the petrified wood during a trip to Arizona in March (and of course another visit to Petrified Forest

National Park). The black walnut base is the same as from a series of side tables that I made about 20 years ago, each with a different thin granite table top surface. Overall height is 21". The petrified wood slab is about 16" x 18". Although the exact species of tree is not definitive (there are only two petrified woods that can be readily identified as to

made of
Walnut and
hickory and
finished with a
mixture of
varnish,
linseed oil, and
turpentine. Its
top coat is
paste wax.
This is my first



chair and learned to make it from a woodworking teacher in Temecula, CA named Taeho Kwon.

Minutes of Board of Directors Meeting (ZOOM)

May 12, 2022

Meeting called to order at 7:00 PM. Members present included: Greg Koenker, King Dahl, Jim Bucknell, Al Ashley, John Ellis, George Lanphear, George Knutson, Jerry Couchman, ,Jim Ferguson, John Braun, Mike Titus, Tony Etienne, Richard Gillingham.

1. Treasurer's Report (Al Ashley). Al had sent email copies of the monthly report to all members of the board.

Total membership stands at 209.

- 2. Membership Committee (Jerry Couchman.) New members 2022 YTD 9 with one pending new member.
- 3. Programs Committee (Jim Ferguson.) Jim provided names of scheduled presenters along with people he's been in contact with regarding future presentations. There was some discussion of live meetings vs. Zoom and how to integrate live presenters with a zoom audience, remote presentations with a mixed audience both at the meeting live and viewing it via zoom. There was further discussion later in the meeting regarding the logistics
- 4. Library Committee (Richard Gillingham.) Checkouts continue at a rate two to three per month.
- 5. Education Committee (Sascha Vandette.) Sascha was not available for the meeting. Greg commented that a couple of VSTs are in the works and should be available within the next month.
- 6. Shows Committee. David and Sascha were not available. Greg and King brought us up to date on status of the Anacortes Arts Festival.
- 7. Resumption of in person membership meetings. A lot of this discussion was on our ability to conduct meetings in person along with Zoom, for the members who are not comfortable with live gatherings The goal is to shoot for live meetings by September or October of this year. Part of this discussion also addressed having the picnic the last week of July vs. August. This was at the request of the school because classes will begin in August, which means that the school staff will be busy preparing for the new school year.

A motion was presented to: a) plan the picnic for the last week of weekend of July, b) plan for July, August, and September General Membership meetings via Zoom, and c) plan for an in person meeting in October with online capability via Zoom. Motion was seconded and passed by show of hands.

Discussion continued regarding equipment needed to run the meetings as hybrid live and via Zoom. Jim Bucknell moved to increase the "Equipment" line item of the Budget by \$1000 (\$1500 total) and give Greg Koenker authority to purchase items needed to interface with the Christian School's AV system. Motion was seconded and passed by show of hands.

The meeting adjourned at approximately 8:30PM.

NCWA Resources

Click this link – <u>NCWA Resources</u> – for our user-friendly database serving the purpose of storing information about recommendations from NCWA members.

There are 5 tables (1 tab for each) across the top, you can click each one to see its contents. This page is evolving and being updated in real time, so there will be new additions frequently.



- **Commercial Resources:** list of companies (incl website and phone #) and what people recommend them for
- **Educational Resources:** online resources for different topics, grouped by topic (this doesn't have to be limited to videos, we can have books and other stuff too)
- Members Recommend: This table is automatically generated by the first two, and keeps track of who's recommending what
- **Recommendation Topics:** This is another automatic table, and lists commercial resources (the first table) grouped by topic
- **Locations:** a final automatic table that lists which commercial resources (again, the first table) are located in which cities, so that it's easier to see what's near you
