

Past-President, and long-time member, Jim Bucknell, will host a presentation showcasing various unique tools and jigs that are favorites in the shops of some of our members.



Anacortes Arts Festival Recap

- Saturday traffic wasn't as heavy as past years but still was a good experience, exposes non-woodworkers to us, able to have better interactions time with visitors
 - o Farmers market helped with traffic, but things slowed down after it closed at 2pm
- Sundays are always slower
- Would like more signs directing traffic toward working artists booths; would also be helpful
 to have more vendors on the side street leading toward working booths
- Traffic of children at Toys for Tots table was more manageable than in past years and donations were higher
- Suggestion to talk with Wood Turners to see if they have the same concerns; maybe can
 jointly address with organizers

Treasurer's Report - Al Ashley

- See Al's report for details
- About \$2,500 more in the bank than at this time last year
- 253 members (233 last year); 40 new members this year (23 in 2023)
- Prorated dues went into effect, \$20 through September 30
- 2025 budget initial review will be next month, approval in October

- Toys for Tots account
 - o Prior to 2018, donations were turned over to Toys for Tots with the Marines
 - Since then, club has kept donations to purchase supplies, currently \$1,530.28
 earmarked for Toys for Tots (\$880.50 brought in this year)
 - New south Toys for Tots group is going strong but north group hasn't met in a few months; John may start up a group at his shop, several members have expressed interest
 - Donations will not be earmarked for a specific north/south group; Toys for Tots committee members should submit for reimbursement

Picnic - Nick Pedersen

- Several volunteers are purchasing food and will report cost to Nick and submit receipts to Al
- Nick will track leftovers to help plan better for future picnics; historically there has never been an RSVP but turnout has never been high (fewer than 100)
 - Leftover uncooked burgers are sometimes sold to offset cost
- Will look into improving process/reducing waste for future years by having a postmortem with Woodturners after the picnic
- Peter and Nick will pick up grill tomorrow, other volunteers are picking up supplies, cooks are lined up

Education Committee - Andrew Pellar

- Talking with teachers and getting dates, working on new class to build a hand plane
- Should have more classes with assistants that are able to handle more people
- Barry is interested in teaching a plant stand class

NCWA Resources

Click this link – <u>NCWA Resources</u> – for our user-friendly database serving the purpose of storing information about recommendations from NCWA members.

There are 5 tables (1 tab for each) across the top, you can click each one to see its contents. This page is evolving and being updated in real time, so there will be new additions frequently.



- **Commercial Resources:** list of companies (incl website and phone #) and what people recommend them for
- **Educational Resources:** online resources for different topics, grouped by topic (this doesn't have to be limited to videos, we can have books and other stuff too)
- **Members Recommend:** This table is automatically generated by the first two, and keeps track of who's recommending what
- **Recommendation Topics:** This is another automatic table, and lists commercial resources (the first table) grouped by topic
- **Locations:** a final automatic table that lists which commercial resources (again, the first table) are located in which cities, so that it's easier to see what's near you

Let Tony know, or post on NCWA-Chat, what you think. This has the potential of being a super convenient, user-friendly database for all members.
