President's Message...



Five Steps for Successful Gluing by Bob Behnke

Bob Behnke is Franklin International's Technical Service Director for the Construction Division, handling all technical aspects of the **Titebond** product line of wood glues, construction adhesives, wood flooring adhesives and sealants.



At Franklin Bob manages a group tasked with handling all calls to the company's 800 number along with technicians tasked with testing of competitive products and new substrates. Bob has worked for over 30 years in the adhesives and sealants industry with experience in the development of emulsion polymers, scale up from bench to production of a range of adhesive technologies and development of breathable technology for organic and inorganic fabrics.

Bob will discuss all aspects of gluing, from dry assembly to waiting for the glue to dry. Wood glues can affect the wood as it is being assembled and being prepared in advance will eliminate costly joint failures and frustrating disassembly.

The presentation will focus on the steps needed to use wood glues with ease, what to watch out for when the glue hits the wood and why failures occur.

Also covered will be some frequently asked questions and why there are so many different wood glues. Bring your gluing questions as we will hold time for discussions, it will not be just a presentation.

Library News

Improved method to record checked out & returned items

Submitted by Bill Pierce – There are always better ways to do things. And that applies to the way we, at your Library, have members record in our log sheets when either returning or checking out an item.

PREVIOUSLY - We had 4 separate logs for members to record into - one each for books or videos to check out, and one each for books or videos being returned. Turns out that we can make it simpler.



NOW - CHECK OUTS: There will only be 1 log sheet for checking out either a book or a video – into the same sheet. This will save time when you want to check out both book(s) and video(s), as all will now be done in one place. And no need to identify if a book or video, as the 'call' numbers tell us that.

NOW - RETURNS: There will only be 1 log sheet for when returning book(s) and/or videos. The list will still be sorted by your last name/first name, and then by the item's call number. The difference is that this list will show - right next to your name - a combination of every book and video you have currently checked out. You won't need to go back and forth between multiple separate logs on separate tables.

BOTTOM LINE: Now only 2 logs to use, one labeled "Library Return" and one labeled "Library Check Out".

Other Woodworking NEWS!...

Epic Weekend at Tom McLaughlin's Shop – Submitted by Mark Kraus

On Sept. 26-28 Mark Kraus had the opportunity to attend one of Tom McLaughlin's Epic Weekends at his workshop in Canterbury, NH (www.epicwoodworking.com).

Twenty three attendees enjoyed three days of immersive presentations and a tour of David Lamb's shop nearby. Andrew Hunter talked about Chinese furniture joinery (crazy precise and intricate) and the use of Japanese hand tools.

Mike Pekovich talked about furniture design in two interesting presentations.

And Tom worked through the design of a dining room arm chair involving the feedback and inputs of the attendees to guide the design process. He mocked up the chair in real time and actually sat on the mockup (only dry fitted!).

We toured David Lamb's workshop where he discussed his love of old belt driven woodworking machines (he restores and regularly uses them) and his extensive portfolio.





David's vintage machines – A belt driven band saw and 24″ jointer. He uses both regularly.

Center for Furniture Craftsmanship

Later in Mark's trip, he visited the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship (<u>www.woodschool.org</u>) in Rockport, Maine. It is composed of multiple buildings that include:

- Three Bench Rooms, each with its associated machine room
- An extensive woodworking library
- The Messler Gallery, with changing woodworking shows

The school has an extensive catalog of year round programs, from basic skills to advanced fellowships. There were probably 100 persons spread across the various classes and benches that day. In one of the bench rooms, a Shaker end table was being built as part of a class – nearly identical to the end table class Mark is teaching for NCWA now. One of the instructors, Tim Rousseau, has produced 51 free videos on various basic woodworking skills, which are very well done (see <u>www.woodschool.org</u>).

What eastern trip would not be complete without a stop at Lie Nielsen in Warren, Maine? Mark talked with the shop foreman, who described the CNC operations to produce their exacting tools. The showroom has one of every tool in it and benches where you can try out the tools before deciding to make the investment.
