Annual Club Picnic

NCWA/NWWWT Picnic & Auction August 16, 1 PM

Our annual joint picnic with Northwest Washington Wood Turners will be on August 16th at the large picnic shelter in Riverfront Park, Sedro-Woolley.

This year, the Turners are hosting and will grill burgers, hot dogs, and brats and provide buns, condiments, and non-alcoholic beverages. Members are encouraged to bring potluck side dishes, salads, chips, or desserts. Please consider bringing your own plates and cutlery to minimize trash generated. Napkins are provided by the Turners.

We will gather at 1 p.m. and serve food at 2 p.m.

Bring tools and wood that you would like added to the silent auction to sell to fellow woodworkers and turners. The Silent Auction will close at 4 p.m., so also bring cash or checks for payment if you are the final bidder on any items.

Silent Auction at the Picnic

For those of you who have never participated in a silent auction, the rules are pretty simple. The seller displays the item for sale with a sales sheet that lists the item, the seller's description of the item, condition (e.g. new; works good; needs repair; etc.), the seller's name, and the minimum allowable bid, if the seller wishes to state one. Anyone interested in buying the item writes down the amount they wish to bid for the item and their name. Anyone else interested in the item can overbid by writing their bid amount and their name on the sheet. Normally, bids would advance by at least 10% over the previous highest bid. Check back often to see if you are still the highest bidder. The highest bidder at the sale cutoff time wins the item, if their bid exceeds the stated minimum bid. The buyer should then pay the seller for the item and take possession. Bring items you wish to sell along with the silent auction bid sheet. Also, bring money and/or a checkbook. You never know what might show up for sale!


December - The Design Symposium returns with a new slate of presenters. Big and better, we hope. And Jerry's Box Making extravaganza returns too.

- Tim Shannon bag to store a fishing rod, hexagonal cedar tube to protect it, and then another bag to protect the tube.
- Bill Keeler 6'8" 3-weight bamboo fly rod, "the fairy," inspired by Doug Moore when he was preparing to teach today's class; bamboo (13 coats of gun Tru oil) and curly maple (5 coats of boat varnish).

Presentation

Bamboo Fly Rod - Doug Moore

- Bamboo is flexible and strong, fiberglass has generally replaced it.
- Tonkin culms "Tea Stick Bamboo" grow singly, easy to cultivate and harvest, dense power cells, less pith, well-spaced nodes, making it superior for rods best pieces of bamboo are selected for rods.

- Culms are 12-feet long, every culm is unique, different wall thicknesses, generally can get 1.5 rods per culm but you have to select the right culm for the rod you want to make.
- Nodes need to be filed down first, then flame the bamboo culm to drive out moisture, making it harder (but more brittle) and darkens the color.
- Split culm into strips and remove dams at the nodes (mark the culm so you know what order to put the strips) can be anywhere from 3-14 sided but 6-sided is most popular; it's very straight-grained so generally splits straight but you have to be careful at the node.
- Stagger nodes (weak spot), cut strips to length so the nodes are at different spots on the rod.
- Prep rectangular strips, then heat and straighten the strips (nodes generally have a kink), and use a 2-way vice to press at the node to straighten and flatten the heated node.
- Mill rectangular strips into triangular shapes, bind for heat treating (20 min at 350 degrees), the binding helps them stay straight and darkens the color.
- Scrape off outer surface "enamel" after baking and then make a final pass over the nodes.
- Taper they get narrower further down the rod but still need to join perfectly to the strips beside it.
- Planing form 2 strips of metal with a v-groove in the middle that can be adjusted to get the width/taper you want, plane off the top or use a specialized mill machine to mill the tapered strips.
- Hollowing a rod take off the apex of the strip's pith lighter weight but still strong.
- Glue-up Unibond 800 glue lay out strips and tape them, put glue on the inside and then roll up and secure with binding using a binding machine with binding going in both directions (if you only bound in one direction, you would have a spiral rod). He marks strips with black so he can line up the black to ensure that his strips are oriented correctly.
- Curing hang the rods to dry and provide heat.
- Cut rod sections to length, turn butt section for reel seat.
- Glue ferrules Super-Z style ferrule uses ferrule glue that you heat (for putting arrow tips on arrows).
- \bullet Make a cork handle comes in $\frac{1}{2}$ " rings that you glue up and then turn on a lathe.
- Add a reel seat and then finish; types of finish Tru-oil, Epifanes.
- Finishing touches Thread wraps on guides.
- How much do rods go for? \$300-400 for a good rod, but up to \$4,000 for a brand name.
- Doug has made several jigs, but many of the tools are commercially available but can be hard to source.

NCWA Resources

Click this link – <u>NCWA Resources</u> – for our user-friendly database serving the purpose of storing information about recommendations from NCWA members.

There are 5 tables (1 tab for each) across the top, you can click each one to see its contents. This page is evolving and being updated in real time, so there will be new additions frequently.



- **Commercial Resources:** list of companies (incl website and phone #) and what people recommend them for
- **Educational Resources:** online resources for different topics, grouped by topic (this doesn't have to be limited to videos, we can have books and other stuff too)
- **Members Recommend:** This table is automatically generated by the first two, and keeps track of who's recommending what
- **Recommendation Topics:** This is another automatic table, and lists commercial resources (the first table) grouped by topic
- **Locations:** a final automatic table that lists which commercial resources (again, the first table) are located in which cities, so that it's easier to see what's near you

Let Tony know, or post on NCWA-Chat, what you think. This has the potential of being a super convenient, user-friendly database for all members.
