President's Message...

Thank you for your continued support and for being a valued member of NCWA. Our members are the heart of this organization, and your participation is crucial to our success.

This letter is to inform you that our annual membership dues will be adjusted from \$35 to \$45, effective for all renewals beginning October 1, 2025. This decision was made after careful consideration by the Board of Directors while reviewing the 2026 budget to ensure we can continue to deliver and enhance the high-quality programs, communication services, and benefits you expect from our club. Like many organizations, we have seen an increase in our operating costs, and this adjustment is necessary to keep pace with these rising expenses.

This membership fee increase, which has not happened in over eight years, will directly support our mission by allowing us to:

- Move to a hosted website at ClubExpress that will improve communication and connection between members, offering photo storage and enhanced services.



- Keep our operations running smoothly and sustainably with investments in food, monthly programs, classes, and audio-video equipment.

- Grow our library and social events, enabling us to improve learning and connectivity.

Our total operating expenditures have been growing year over year, from \$7.76K in 2023 to \$10.8K in 2024, with our current budget for 2025 coming in at \$15K. We are committed to being responsible stewards of your contributions and believe this adjustment will provide a better overall membership experience for everyone. While this is a relatively small increase, we are confident that the enhanced value you receive from your membership will continue to make it a worthwhile investment. Remember to use your 10% discount at our many local vendors that support NCWA.

Thank you once again for your support. We look forward to the year ahead.

Recent Classes



Bonnie writes:



Presentation

Making a chisel - Paul Thorne, blacksmith

Smithing has been around for about 10,000 years, probably starting with copper; took 20 years to become a master

Does not take brute force, it takes technique

Paul works with iron, usually finds or is given free scrap iron

Iron is 55,000-65,000 pounds/square inch tensile strength, up to 120,000 pounds

Heating iron to 1800-2000 degrees fahrenheit (using propane forge) allows you to mold it into any shape by hitting it. Forging makes the metal close to 40% stronger than it was.

Kings often had slaves who were ironworkers, were valued for their skills

Uses basic tools - everything can be done strictly with muscle power using an anvil, tongs, and a heavy hammer

Presentation was on making a chisel out of an old file, which are extremely hard and tough and can retain a sharp edge

First need to calculate how much material you need and cut the chisel to the right length

Forge the tang (handle) first

Uses a "guillotine" to dent the sides and then pound out the tang

Tang is pounded to about ¼" wide and burned into a wood handle, he uses a special epoxy to secure it in the handle

Next, forge the blade. He always brands his work with his name

Final shaping and cleanup using grinders

Heat treating to make it even harder on the cutting edge but tough enough not to break

When iron hits 1675 degrees, it loses its ability to hold a magnet (critical temperature), so that's how he checks that it's at the right temperature

Cools it very quickly to freeze the molecules where they are. First use oil to quench it (will catch on fire) - will cool quickly without breaking metal. Can't let it cool slowly or the molecules go back to how they were. As long as he doesn't heat it back up again, it will stay that combination of hardness and toughness.

Handle is made of mahogany, put 2 copper rings on it to prevent it from splitting when pitting it with a hammer.

His art pieces are colorful using heat patina - 300 degrees makes the metal turn yellow, continuing to heat it will give you gold, then pink, then royal purple, then blue. Coat with wax or lacquer to stop corrosion and the colors will last for decades

Hammers (made from truck axels) have 2 ends - one rounded to move the metal in all directions, and one cross peen to move it in just 2 directions. Using those to head shapes, he can move the metal into any shape he wants. Handles made from hockey sticks (clear ash). Hickory baseball bats are also good, but cut them into rectangles so you know which way your head is facing when you're quickly switching between ends.

Can tell if the steel is low carbon (.1% carbon), medium carbon (.8% carbon), or high carbon (1.1% carbon) by the sparks when you put it to a grinder Takes about an hour total to finish a chisel once you know what you're doing. Classes - Call 360-293-8257, visit thornemetals.com, for more info

Club should look into setting up as a 501(c)3 to accept tax-deductable donations

\$250-300 fee for application, \$20 secretary of state annual fee

Can take several months to get approval from IRS

Annual reporting and filing requirements

A lot of woodworking guilds in the US are 501(c)3s

Would also be beneficial for future shared space

Challenge is timing and work to set it up

Board voted to pursue 501(c)3 status

Andrew and Al will take the lead, Christi will be kept in the loop

Mark will talk with donor and will look into storage option

There are 5 tables (1 tab for each) across the top, you can click each one to see its contents. This page is evolving and being updated in real time, so there will be new additions frequently.



- **Commercial Resources:** list of companies (incl website and phone #) and what people recommend them for
- **Educational Resources:** online resources for different topics, grouped by topic (this doesn't have to be limited to videos, we can have books and other stuff too)
- **Members Recommend:** This table is automatically generated by the first two, and keeps track of who's recommending what
- **Recommendation Topics:** This is another automatic table, and lists commercial resources (the first table) grouped by topic
- **Locations:** a final automatic table that lists which commercial resources (again, the first table) are located in which cities, so that it's easier to see what's near you
